a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The primary goal for this project is to improve health care access across the central Florida region by increasing the number of graduates from the college health care programs, including nursing. This increased capacity for graduates will help fill the large gaps in regional and statewide workforce needs and provide a highly trained and skilled workforce in high-demand healthcare areas. Jobs will also be created during construction and support regional economic development.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Labs and classrooms will be constructed to double the capacity of Seminole State's allied health programs, including nursing. The instruction activity in this building will help to fill critical gaps in regional and statewide workforce needs, particularly nursing and allied health fields. By producing graduates to meet workforce needs in healthcare and increasing the number of providers, citizens will gain better access to quality and affordable health care.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Jobs will be created during the construction phase. The number of providers including nurses and respiratory therapists will be increased as students are trained and placed in high-demand healthcare jobs. Placement rates currently exceed 93%, and nursing grads have a first-time pass rate of 98.55% on the NCLEX exam. Employers will be provided more well-trained graduates prepared to immediately enter the workforce in occupations currently experiencing dire shortages. By producing graduates to meet workforce needs in healthcare and increasing the number of providers, citizens will gain better access to quality and affordable health care.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

College students, high school dual enrollment students, workers returning to refresh or enhance skills, economically disadvantaged persons, and jobless persons. The number of students served is expected to double from ~4,500 to ~9,000.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

This project will lead to increasing the number of providers such that citizens will gain better access to quality and affordable health care. This will be measured in collaboration with our healthcare leaders using data on job placement, staff turnover, increase in number of patients served, and quality of patient outcomes. Graduates will benefit from acquiring high demand jobs in a stable career with high wages. This will be measured by job placement rates and average salary within one, three and five years of graduating. Businesses will move to the region and invest in growth due to improved access to quality healthcare leading to economic growth.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

Seminole State College has standard performance clauses in all of its contracts which ensure that work will be completed in accordance with the workplan and list of deliverables, including provisions relating to the payment and withholding of funds as necessary. It is not anticipated that additional penalties will be needed.
