As a result of the horrendous terrorist attack by Hamas against Israel on October 7, antisemitism is rising significantly and violent threats against the JCCs have also multiplied as well. This is in addition to the notable rise in reported hate crimes against Jews over the past two years. This request is a continuation of the preventative security initiative the Florida legislature approved last year. This initiative was developed to prevent and/or respond to security threats leveled against the Jewish community by putting our human and physical resources to work in the most effective ways.

14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

This request represents Phase 2 of our local security initiative which was funded last year by the Florida Legislature. Due to the war in Israel which is a result of the brutal Hamas terrorist attacks, the risks the greater Tampa Jewish community now faces has increased significantly in addition to seriously rising antisemitism that has been recognized by the FBI the past few years. Increased security and greater security expertise has been and will continue to be will be implemented as a result of funding this project. This will allow us to continue to employ a Director of Security, an Executive Director of Combating Antisemitism, and a Jewish Community Relations Council Director. Together, these three professionals will supervise our contract security and serve as resources for the entire community to help increase security and effectively fight antisemitism.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Our facilities are open to the entire community, Jewish and non-Jewish, offering services such as summer camp, fitness facilities, a public art center, a business accelerator, an event center, and more. All persons using or visiting our JCC facilities will benefit from increased security and lives may very well be saved. The educational component will help in the fight against antisemitism. Everyone who visits our propertuies is at risk regardless of their faith, race, or ethnicity.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Citizens (visitors to the Bryan Glazer Family JCC) will experience a higher level of safety. This funding will allow us to be as prepared as possible to deal with life-threatening situations. We serve as first stop for security information throughout the community and a conduit to those with the greatest expertise.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

All users of and visitors to the Shanna and Bryan Glazer JCC will benefit from this increased security. Greater than 800 people visit the Bryan Glazer Family every day and, on some days, that number exceeds 2,000 visitors. We estimate nearly 300,000 people visit this JCC every year.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

We hope that we never have to demonstrate how prepared we are to deal with emergency situations but chances are we will at some point. The expected benefit is that our preparedness will save lives and prevent any harm intended for our members, guests, and staff. This will be an ongoing effort and, in light of the significant growth of antisemitism in our state, country, and around the world and the war in Israel, there's no end in sight.
