#### 14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

S.E.C. Elementary and Middle School Mentoring Series Initiative's primary goal is preventing youth entrance into the delinquency system and further reduce youth recidivism rates by providing targeted prevention & intervention evidence-based model programing for at-risk youth and their families. Providing life skills, character development training, family support services and financial & educational literacy that aims to diminish the likelihood of delinquent behavior.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Workshops on integrity, resilience, empathy, role-playing exercises to practice character traits, Community engagement activities to promote social responsibility, Personalized tutoring sessions, Workshops on study skills/time management, Access to academic resources/textbooks and educational materials, One-on-one guidance and counseling, Goal setting and action planning, Self-confidence building.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Character Development: We instill integrity, resilience, and empathy through workshops and community engagement. Academic Support: Tailored tutoring, study skills, and resources for academic success. Mentoring: Personalized guidance for goal setting and self-confidence.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The targeted population is at-risk youth, elementary and grade school students that reside in high-risk communities of single parent families, The total # of individuals to be served is approximately 125.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Measure assessing the impact of reducing criminal recidivism based on increased engagement with their children and the inherent conscious desire to be a positive example for their children. -Survey or self-reported data from both the fathers and the mothers or primary caregivers can be used to gather information on the fathers' ability to abstain from criminal activity. Character development, mentoring, and academic support programs significantly reduce juvenile justice system involvement, evidenced by a 30% decrease in juvenile arrests and school suspensions among participating children. -Survey or self-reported data from participating youth, parents and teachers in addition to interfacing with DJJ PAT.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?



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Financial Deductions: Imposing fines or deductions in payment for every instance of non-compliance or failure to meet the agreed deliverables.

Contractual Remedies: Enforcing remedies stated in the contract like remedial actions or additional services at no extra cost to compensate for the failure in performance. Holding back or delaying payments until the agreed deliverables or performance measures are satisfactorily met. Initiating dispute resolution mechanisms like arbitration or mediation as specified in the contract to resolve issues related to non-compliance.
