### 14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



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These requested funds will provide the CPR/AED equipment for the public high schools that either can't afford or do not have sufficient equipment to teach the psychomotor skills needed to save lives at school, home and in the public setting. In the U.S there are over 356,000 out-of-hospital cardiac arrests annually; mortality rate exceeds 90 percent and 7 of 10 occur at home. First responders often are unable to arrive in time to save these patients. Teaching students CPR will put thousands of qualified lifesavers in our community, year after year.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

These funds will enable CPR/AED instructors, in the public high schools, to provide individual hands on CPR training and how to use use an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) for the 9th and 11th grade students throughout the State.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

CPR and how to use an AED hands-on training of our 9th and 11th grade students will provide the knowledge, confidence and muscle memory of how to save a life during an out-of-hospital cardiac incident. Each person taking part in this training has the potential to be a lifesaver. Survival is directly linked to the amount of time between onset of cardiac arrest and treatment. Training our students will encourage them to confidently get involved to help save lives. Teaching students CPR will put thousands of qualified lifesavers in our community, year after year.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population to be served: All Floridians. There are more than 3 million students (K-12) in the Florida School system. Over 179,000 students will graduate high school annually, with CPR/AED training. Teaching students CPR will put thousands of qualified lifesavers in our community, year after year.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Students can save lives by knowing what to do during those precious few minutes after someone experiences a cardiac arrest and before the first responders arrive. They can save brothers and sisters, parents, coaches and teachers, and other adults – including strangers. The expected benefit of this appropriation is countless lives saved. The methodology by which the outcome will be measured will be lives saved and tracked through hospitals, fire service, EMS and FDOH vital statistics.
