14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The funds requested will be used for the renovation of buildings and site upgrades at the Fire Academy, EMS, and Criminal Justice Center facilities. These facilities require maintenance and upgrades in order to remain operational.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

The services to be provided are related to the construction/renovation's costs for the Public Safety facilities.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Upgrading and renovating the Public Safety Program facilities will allow for FSCJ to continue to operate the Fire Academy, EMS Program, and Criminal Justice Center (Police Academy) at full capacity. The graduates in these program areas will be able to fill critical public safety workforce needs as fire fighters, police officers, and EMT's. The renovated facilities will also allow for FSCJ to continue to offer in-service training for existing first responders.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population is college students and existing first responders. The Public Safety Programs serve more than 8,000 students and existing first responders annually, including 252 EMT students, 293 fire fighter students, 3,822 JFRD employees for continuing workforce training, 1,393 regional fire department (non JFRD) employees, 240 basic law enforcement students, 54 basic corrections students, 56 community service officer students, and 2,321 JSO employees for in-service training.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

By upgrading the Public Safety Facilities, FSCJ will be able to increase its capacity to serve and graduate more fire fighter, EMT, and police officer students and enhance their educational experience. This will contribute to greater safety in the Duval and Nassau areas. The benefit will be measured by the increase in enrollment and graduation rates of students in the Fire Academy, EMS Program, and Police Academy.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

If the College is unable to complete the project, funds will be reverted back to the agency.
