### 14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

State funds will build on and continue last year's support for 21st Century interactive exhibits, including digital preservation and presentation of the testimonies of Holocaust survivors and liberators. These crucial resources will support the educational, exhibition, collection, and conservation needs of The Museum for the benefit of students, teachers, and visitors for generations to come.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

State funds will help The Museum to digitally preserve the testimonies of Holocaust survivors and liberators; support salaries for staff who are digitizing and indexing objects, testimonies, and artifacts from Holocaust survivors and liberators; fund expenses related to artifact, testimony, and art digitization and indexing; and provide conservation, care, and photography of survivor objects and art.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The Museum uses state-of-the-art technologies to reach more than 1,300 teachers, 300,000 students, and 24,000 individuals who are impacted through virtual educational programs, survivor talks, and commemorations each year. In addition, The FHM has trained two thousand law enforcement officers since the Law Enforcement and Society training program's inception.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

More than 1,300 teachers, 300,000 students, and 24,000 individuals who are impacted through The Museum's virtual educational programs, survivor talks, and commemorations each year.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

It is well documented that as the last remaining Holocaust survivors pass away their stories remain more relevant than ever. It also demonstrates the need as a state to ensure that first-rate Holocaust outreach and education empowers current and next-generation leaders with the knowledge and tools they need to confront the extremes of hatred and persecution in their homes and communities. Outcomes will be measured by the number of teachers and students accessing FHM exhibits and materials and the number of program and exhibition attendees each year.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

Dispersed funds for deliverables not met will be returned to the state.
