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14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The Multipurpose Teen center's primary purpose is to use educational and recreational offerings to promote social and academic qualities in youth. Our primary goals include: Creating a vibrant, safe, attractive, viable youth outreach center, serving as a point of gang intervention and substance

abuse prevention, that is heavily used and considered a model program for the Big Bend Area.

Supporting youth mastery of educational benchmarks (math and literacy are identified areas of focus) through tutoring and supplemental educational programs.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

This teen center will promote activities that lead to improved social and emotional competencies that will contribute to healthy identities in youth. More so, teens will engage in academic activities that will improve academic achievement in reading and math that will lead to learning gains on state assessment tests (25% of Gadsden County's adults are reading at or below a 5th grade reading level). Career readiness activities will give teens early exposure to the labor market and prepare them for the world of work, which in turn, will increase economic development in our local communities because teens learn the skills that businesses are looking for. Finally, this teen center will support working families and businesses by providing a safe, engaging environment for students to engage with while parents are working.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Under direct supervision of youth counselors, coordinators, and consultants, the Youth Center will offer organized instructional programs that promote the arts (dance, yoga, drawing, painting, music, graphic design, 2D/3D printing, etc.), STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics), service, leadership, and health and fitness. Through the creation of education and career programs, teens will have the opportunity to gain experience in workplace readiness, college preparedness, scholarship assistance, career exploration, and more. The goal of the center is to offer these services to teens free of charge.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Economically disadvantaged individuals, at-risk youth middle and high school students, and college students will be served directly and hundreds more indirectly. The target population for this project will be Gadsden County children ages 11 to 18 years. In some cases, the center will be open to children ages 4-10, when special programs are in place to accommodate them. We expect to serve 500-750 kids with this project.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Benefits/Outcomes:

Decreased rate in overall juvenile crime/arrests and substance use of program participants.

Decreased rate in truancy at the local middle schools and high school for program participants.

Increase in youth career-readiness skill-based competencies and youth employment.

Improved mental health from mindfulness activities and service-learning projects.

Increase in STEM engagement, identity, career interest, career knowledge, relationships, critical thinking, and perseverance.

Increase in overall health and wellness knowledge through the establishment of health behaviors to prevent chronic

Impact will be measured through ongoing qualitative and quantitative analysis of program effectiveness via parent/student surveys, partnership surveys, staff surveys, after-school curriculum achievement measures, attendance data from the Gadsden school district, and data from the Gadsden County Sheriff's Office.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

Balance of expended funds would be returned to the State if deliverables or performance measures are not met.
