14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

End sex trafficking in Florida. Increase public awareness to the issue sex trafficking and exploitation, educate the public regarding services available for sex trafficking victims, conduct anti-sex trafficking education to prevent the commercial sexual exploitation of children and youth, increase outreach and services to sex trafficking victims on the streets and in jails, and increase and enhance victim treatment and restoration services available to survivors of sex trafficking both locally and statewide.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Anti-human trafficking programming to raise public awareness, prevention education to end commercial sexual exploitation of children/youth, increased street based victim outreach & support, court diversion program for victims, specialized assessment and trauma resolution therapy provided by licensed professionals to victims in safehouse treatment programs, trauma informed advocacy, support and case management to victims "on the streets" as identified and referred by law enforcement, enhanced coordination of services toward victim restoration, and intensive anti-sex trafficking training to other Florida agencies to increase the capacity of services available to victims statewide.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Public awareness, education, prevention curriculum to school-age students, adults, street outreach, victim advocacy, community & jail-based victim support groups, trauma informed case management, court diversion program, linkage to community resources. Residential clinical & victim restoration services, intensive training to other anti-sex trafficking nonprofits to increase statewide capacity.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Victims of sex trafficking and sexual exploitation, at-risk youth, elementary and high school students, university/college students, persons with poor mental health, persons who are jobless, economically disadvantaged, or homeless, currently or formerly incarcerated persons, and the general public, community groups, churches, and other agencies. >400 victims are expected to be served. In addition, >1,400 youth ages 5-17 at risk of being sex trafficked are anticipated to be educated with prevention curriculum, and >900,000 from the general public to be provided with awareness and education about the issue of sex trafficking in America.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?



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Project targets root causes of criminal behavior in sex trafficking victims including but not limited to prostitution, drug-related offenses and gang-affiliated charges. Upon graduation of our program, 87% of our clients do not return to their previous life in the streets. Improve the physical health of sex-trafficking survivors with access to dental and medical care. Trauma therapy to improve the mental health of clients related but not limited to: Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder, Depression and Anxiety, Bi-Polar Disorder, and Cognitive Dysfunction. Reduce substance abuse with services including clinical counseling, weekly Narcotics/Alcoholic Anonymous meetings, and group therapy sessions. Increase self-sufficiency with development of educational needs and critical thinking skills, obtaining a GED. Children and adults learn to recognize the signs of trafficking, how to stay safe, and what to do in dangerous situations. All performance outcomes are reported monthly to the OAG.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

3% reduction to monthly invoice, as per contract requirements is an effective penalty to enforce agency to meet or exceed monthly and yearly target service numbers and outcomes.
