14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The specific purpose and goal of project is to help seal the envelop of Chaudoin Hall by restoring its 515 antique windows, including those in 38 gable dormers. Stunning details include ensembles of windows in arched walls with glass panes in arched, curvilinear, diamond, square, rectangular, teardrop and triangular configurations. Transoms display lancet, diamond, and triangular panes. Gambrel roof ends are embellished with Palladian windows filled with rectangular and curved glass sunbursts. Square bay inglenooks contain large window systems. The project will restore, repair, and seal the windows, many of which are over 100 years old and help ensure another century of service.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Stetson University has consulted with leading preservation experts about the project, both architects and contractors, as well as specialists in the field of historic window restoration. Many of the 100+ year-old windows are in fair-to-poor condition. The quality of the original wood casings, rails, stiles and bars are assessed as old-growth cypress and pine suitable for restoration and repairs to withstand the elements for another 100 years. All activities and services will meet the intended purposes of the window restoration project with costs for labor, materials, and supplies to complete the project.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

As a three-story brick building, Chaudoin Hall is highly visible and available to the public, located 100' from US Highway 17/92 in Central Florida. The open campus is divided by the federal highway with over 18,000 vehicle trips daily, good sidewalks, and a mid-block crosswalk to provide easy access from an adjacent parking area. Consequently, citizens will have the opportunity to experience this significant resource. The completed project will help seal the building against the elements and provide Stetson with utilities savings. The project will promote efforts to recruit and retain female students, providing them comfortable living accommodations in a setting for families who prefer a women-only residential community.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Chaudoin Hall contains 55,540 gsf with 100 bedrooms and 185 bed capacity. The direct population served will be 185 full-time undergraduate young women. The larger population to be served is the student body of 2,500 full-time undergraduates. Chaudoin Hall alumni are represented by 1,000s of women for whom Chaudoin Hall was their home during their Stetson education. Driven by Stetson's Marketing blasts, messages of state support to help preserve Chaudoin Hall will resonate across the campus and alumni base, DeLand and Volusia County, and the State of Florida.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The expected benefits and outcomes include:

1. restore 515 windows using standards of the Florida Department of State, Division of Historical Resources;

The methodology to measure outcomes include:

- 1. tracking and reporting to the Department the completed project.
- 2. marketing and showcasing the success at state historic preservation conferences and community outreach programs.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?



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If Stetson University fails to meet deliverables and/or performance measures in the agreement, the funds will be returned to the State of Florida in addition to the standard penalties in the contract. Founded in 1883, Stetson University has an excellent record with the Florida Department of State requesting, managing, implementing and reporting on education, cultural, and preservation grants since the 1980s using standard agreements and restrictive covenants applicable to state laws
