4. Project/Program Description

The Veterans Law Institute (VLI) was created to serve the needs of the 1.5 million veterans throughout Florida. The Veterans Advocacy Clinic (VAC), a program of the VLI, focuses its work on helping veterans receive the disability compensation benefits they have earned from both the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and the Department of Defense (DoD). The VAC accomplishes this through direct services and policy work. Since 2014, the VAC's work has resulted in veterans receiving approximately \$23.1 million dollars in additional future benefits they have earned, as well as \$12.7 million dollars in back benefits for veterans. The total projected lifetime benefits for these veterans and family members is estimated to be over \$42.4 million dollars. Over the course of one year, law students and VLI attorneys pour approximately 200-300 hours of free legal work into each veteran's case. The VAC current carries as many as 80 active client cases at a time.

14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



The goal of VAC is to transform a veteran's life by opening the door to the benefits he or she has earned. Not only can obtaining these benefits completely change the lives of veterans living on the edge of homelessness, but it can also allow veterans to get needed medical treatment at VA facilities more quickly as VA recognizes that their injuries are service-connected. The VAC helps veterans and their family members by developing evidence and arguing their cases within the complex and confusing framework of the Dept. of Veterans Affairs' disability benefits application and appeals process. Legal assistance is provided as veterans file claims, appeal decisions at the local level, the Board of Veterans' Appeals, and at the U.S. Court of Appeals for Veterans Claims in Washington, D.C.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

To be successful at both the DoD and the VA, the veteran normally will require medical evidence to be submitted on his or her behalf. Each medical examination or review can cost anywhere from \$2500-5000 depending on the nature of the examination and the type of professional administering the testing (psychologist, forensic psychologist, neuropsychologist, or neurologist). We are requesting funding to help provide medical examinations for each of these cases as well. We also use funds to provide transportation to and from evaluation appointments and hearings for homeless and very low income veterans. The funds will also provide resources for outreach to veterans and veteran groups, intake interviews, conducting case analysis, performing fact investigations, preparing claims, and drafting briefs.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Legal services to access earned benefits from the US Dept. of Veterans Affairs. This will include outreach to veterans and veteran groups, intake interviews, conducting case analysis, performing fact investigations, gathering witness statements, collecting new medical evidence and opinions from specialists, preparing claims, drafting briefs, appealing decisions, navigating the complex VA decision/appeals system, referrals to other vetted agencies for additional support.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Disabled veterans, family members of veterans, widows/widowers of veterans, elderly persons, persons with poor mental health, persons with poor physical health, jobless persons, economically disadvantaged persons, homeless persons, physically disabled persons, currently or formerly incarcerated persons, university/college students, and victims of crime. Between 200-300 persons are expected to be served through direct representation, referrals, and information. The VAC currently must refer 90% of the veterans and family members applying for our services out to other organizations due to our limited resources.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will

be measured?

Improvement in mental health. At least 45 veterans will enroll in and/or seek services and treatment for serviceconnected mental health conditions from VA.

Improvement in physical health. At least 45 veterans will be assisted in successfully pursuing benefits for disability from VA which will allow better access to appointment at the VA Medical Centers with less co-payments.

Improvement in the quality of education. At least 30 law students will work with veterans and learn veterans law.

Improvement in economic activity and enhancing specific individual's economic self-sufficiency. Case management will track and report monetary increases for veterans assisted.

Reduction in substance abuse. Veterans who receive VA benefits will get priority health care in order to seek individualized and frequent treatment to reduce substance abuse. This will be measured with case management software and statistics.
