4. Project/Program Description

A child's vision plays a crucial role in their academic performance. Vision issues in children impact cognitive, social, and physical development, as well as their future health and overall well-being. The Pediatric Vision Center and its programs is a partnership between the USF Health Eye Institute and Lions World Vision Institute that provides vision screenings, comprehensive eye exams, treatments and surgical interventions, and dispenses glasses as needed, at no cost to children who are uninsured and/or socioeconomically disadvantaged. Vision disorders that affect early learning have the best outcomes if treated by the age of 8. Our comprehensive approach, including STEM education and community outreach, will have a lasting impact on thousands of children with vision issues, not just in Tampa Bay but nationwide. This initiative not only promotes eye health but also serves as a model for healthcare facilities actively contributing to their mission through innovation.

This loan was forgiven in January 2021. On February 1, 2021, the organization received a second loan of \$1,729,233 to fund payroll, rent, and utilities, which was forgiven on August 2021.

14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

Provide vision screenings, eye exams, eyeglasses, referrals to the University of South Florida (USF) for surgical interventions and provide age-appropriate STEM curriculum for eye education purposes to under served children ages 0-17 primarily uninsured, enrolled in VPK, Title 1 schools and/or in living in low-socioeconomic communities. These services are provided at no cost and are designed to improve improve school performance, prevent blindness, increase access to health care for the uninsured, and assist families.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Our Pediatric Vision Center, mobile vision unit and early intervention programs will ensure that children have the best opportunity for success in the classroom, and in life. Vision screening, glasses as needed, and education services would be provided by LWVI while patients needing more comprehensive eye exams will be referred to our clinical partner, the USF Eye Institute, which will provide exams, clinical care and surgery if required. A program vision health coordinator will assist students and families by helping them understand the process of treatment, compliance and follow-up care.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The appropriation project will provide children a range of direct services, including vision screening, complete eye examinations, provision of eyeglasses and, if necessary, surgical interventions for eye-related issues. Additionally, citizens will have access to educational programs covering eye anatomy basics, hygiene practices, and guidance to prevent avoidable blindness. For children, there will be age-appropriate STEM curriculum. Moreover, the project will also connect individuals with social service agencies designed to help lift families out of poverty and improve their access to healthcare.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Economically disadvantaged individuals, including at-risk youth and students from preschool to high school, that face vision problems often result in academic challenges, low self-esteem, and reduced interest in learning. Hillsborough County Public Schools, one of the nation's largest districts, serves 224,149 students in 311 schools. In Hillsborough County, where 40% of residents live below the poverty line, many children lack access to essential eye care, impacting their academic success and future prospects. This issue also extends to neighboring counties, such as Pasco, Manatee-Sarasota, and Pinellas.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will

be measured?



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In its study "Abandoned in the Back Row: New Lessons in Education and Delinquency Prevention," the Coalition for Juvenile Justice reported, "The biggest finding is that school failure is one of the earliest and best predictors for future delinquent and criminal behavior." The expected outcome is that children in the Tampa Bay region are given the best opportunity for success in schools and in life. We will track the children who are screened and who receive comprehensive eye exams, glasses, and treatments through the program, follow-up with school nurses, parents/caregivers to

ensure the children receive the follow-up care and early intervention that they need.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

The equipment and all assets would be liquidated and funding returned to its original source.
