14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



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The funds will support program development, classroom materials, professional instructors, art, music and dance supplies, data collection and reporting, field trips and other program management tasks. For over 23 years, Prodigy has served over 45,000 youth across West Central Florida with a 99% non-recidivism rate. Since 2011, Prodigy has been funded by the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice at 4.4 million dollars, in 2017 the program was caught up in a shift moving "after school" providers under FDOE. Prodigy was cut by 3.3 million dollars and hundreds of youth went without services, which juvenile delinquency rates soared. The program was moved back to DJJ in 2018 but funding was not restored.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Prodigy Cultural Arts implements classes, both in person which are taught by professional artists. Classes consist of a variety of arts disciplines which are infused with life skill activities to teach anger management, leadership, problem solving, and communication skills. Activities such as field trips, educational workshops, mentoring sessions, community events and showcase are also included. Showcases are high level talent shows where participants show off their artwork or stage or music productions to share what they have learned throughout the year.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Participants enrolled in Prodigy receive a life skills and risk assessment to gauge what type of services they need. This may include other services such as mentoring, tutoring, or case management. They also receive their choice of art classes or music, dance, photography, performance and others. Participants (and their parents) also receive workshops on academic enrichment, career development, parent/child communication, money management and other life skills all taught by professionals. Lastly, Prodigy staff do outreach calls and case management to help keep youth on track.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

2500 youth ages 5-17 from 10 west central Florida counties are expected to be served. Prodigy targets communities in which law enforcement has deemed at risk for high levels of crime and delinquency. Youth are enrolled who are or have seen to be at risk for school dropout and other delinquent behavior. Prodigy serves west central Florida communities from south St. Petersburg over to Tampa, to Lakeland and to the other side of I4 in Orange County. Prodigy also serves rural communities such as Lacoochee (Pasco) and Sebring/Avon Park (Highlands).

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Prodigy is monitored by the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice and each month Prodigy has to submit tracking data to DJJ to see how the youth are doing, if they have had contact with law enforcement and if they are completing classes. The main goal of Prodigy is to keep youth out of the juvenile justice system. The latest DJJ's CAR (Comprehensive Accountability Report) reveals that over 99% of Prodigy youth did not get into trouble with law enforcement when enrolled.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

If Prodigy does not meet the deliverables, DJJ imposes a corrective action plan in which agencies work on their improvements within an allotted time frame. These improvements are documented in a system called PMM and is regularly checked by DJJ staff. Once the action plan is complete, there is a review by DJJ to determine if all corrective goals and deliverables were met. If not, penalties persist including a possible reduction of funds or termination of contract.
