14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



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Arts Conservatory for Teens uses the arts as a catalyst for holistic student development and provides high level arts education, in many different disciplines across multiple sites, to create pathways for stronger futures for youth ages 11-18. ACT has successfully reached over 13,000 students with a 100% high school graduation rate and a 90% rate of admission to college. State funding will expand ACT's current annual impact from 700 to 3,000 students.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

ACT's creative and performing arts programming will provide students with the skills needed to thrive in high school, with a 100% graduation rate for program participants, while building a path toward future successful careers in the creative workforce and developing their social and emotional well-being.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

ACT will expand its programming to reach more students on an annual basis, providing weekly core classes, as well as master classes, and workshops in areas such as health and wellness, financial literacy, leadership, and entrepreneurship. ACT also incorporates character essentials into all of its instruction, which includes building important life skills and character essential for the workforce.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population for this project includes grade school students, high school students, economically disadvantaged persons, and at-risk youth. Over 800 individuals are expected to be served through this project.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

State funding would allow ACT to replicate and scale this unique and highly successful program, with 100% high school graduation rate and a 90% rate of admission to college, by boosting the number of students served annually from 700 to over 3,000 in the Tampa Bay area. The measurement method will be provided by a third party to include focus groups, surveys, and interviews of students, parents, and teachers. ACT will also track improved school attendance and standardized test scores, and survey students on confidence, concentration, and improving views on their education.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

Disbursed funds for deliverables not met would be returned to the state.
