14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



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The overarching goals of the program are to 1) intensify efforts to invest in underserved communities and strengthen sectoral partnerships; 2) increase access to trades training and learning pathways leading to meaningful careers; and 3) increase the talent pipeline and number of registered apprenticeships. There are 3 main training components to the program: pre-apprenticeship, apprenticeship and summer exploration for high school and college aged youth. The Pre-Apprenticeship component is a 6-to-8-week training program designed to 'fast track' students into employment or apprenticeship. It provides career-readiness, stackable certifications, on-the-job training, and career opportunities to adults and youth, ages 16-24, in Hillsborough County.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Recruitment of potential applicants, Screening and Assessments to ensure viability of students in the program, Soft-skills training to ensure employee retention, Certification Training, On the Job Training, and Case Management to remove any potential barriers to program completion as well as employee retention.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Recruitment, Screening, and Assessments take place during the initial phase of the program and are used as tools to ensure candidates would be a good fit for the program. Soft skills include interviewing skills, time management, resume writing, etc., Certification Training provides 4–6-week skills training. On The Job Training provides hands-on training during initial employment.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

We are prepared to train, certify, and connect over 100 jobless, economically disadvantages, and formerly incarcerated citizens living in Hillsborough County to careers in areas experiencing critical workforce shortages -- namely, healthcare and construction.

- e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?
- 1. An increase in economic activity will be measured by the number of students that are placed in jobs post training, which will reduce vacant positions and increasing production in high-demand industries: Data will be collected from employers to show an increase in production based on the job placements of students.
- 2. 98% of recruited students will receive certification training and 90% will obtain immediate employment with employer partners. The specific measure will be the number of students that complete training and are employed: Data will be collected to measure the number of students earning certifications and placed into employment. The program will track those employed for 12 months post training to measure job retention.
- 3. Employment opportunities provided to students will improve their economic self-sufficiency by paying higher than average wages and benefits. Outcome is that 98% of those employed will have an increase in their economic self-sufficiency.
- f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?
