a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



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To promote awareness of food programs, and advance food advocacy. The objective is to offer education, training, and resources to empower individuals and communities economically, ultimately improving food security. The educational components encompass topics such as nutrition, food preparation, and community gardening techniques. Youth leadership workshops are designed to equip youth with tools that will help mitigate barriers related to hunger.

#### b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Raising awareness about nutrition and healthy eating through educational programs to promote healthy eating habits. Conducting workshops and training sessions on food prep, meal planning, budgeting, and benefits of community gardens.

gardens. Provide information on available resources on government programs. Establish Advocacy Program to help youth learn how to advocate for their families and communities.

#### c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Information Sessions- Provide sessions in various formats for participants to learn about federal nutrition programs & it benefits. Assist participants wit qualification & application process.

Nutrition Education Classes- Provide classes that combine education, exploration, and fun activities to help ensure foundation in healthy eating habits.

Community Gardening

Youth Advocacy Program will teach advocacy & leadership workshops.

#### d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Targeted population are children, teens, and low-income adults residing in food deserts. We expect to serve a total of 400-800 individuals.

# e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Outcome: Participants will cultivate healthier eating habits, incorporating increased consumption of fruits and vegetables, reducing the intake of sugary and processed foods, and establishing regular meal patterns.

Methodology: Evaluate participants' comfort levels with the provided information through pre and post surveys, measuring the effectiveness of the education on healthier eating habits.

Outcome: Address immediate hunger challenges through proactive initiatives such as food drives, community gardens, and other project activities.

Methodology: Quantify participant involvement in community activities by tracking the frequency of participation and measuring impact in pounds of food collected or distributed.

Outcome Students will learn advocacy awareness and ways to implement change within their community. Methodology: Create community maps to identify resources, strengths, and areas that need improvement and will help lead to solutions.
