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### 14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

Develop Florida PROACT (Program for Resilient Ocean Areas CommuniTies) program. Expand pre- and post-disaster services across Florida, build rapid disaster response capabilities, expand research outcomes in the Florida Institute for Built Environment Resilience (FIBER) to benefit all Florida communities, and expand the Fire & Emergency Services (FES) program to include a college-wide 3-semester post professional master's program in Resilience and Disaster Response.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Al and other advanced computation, policy and planning research, methods of community engagement, advances in building technologies, flood risk assessment and modeling tools. Development of a master's degree program in Resilience and Disaster response, as well as a focus on measurable change in Florida communities before and after by providing effective activities and services.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Bridge gaps between emergency management, response, long-range planning, and eventual construction that currently hampers rebuilding efforts and long-term resilience during Florida's hurricane season. Increase the capacity of FIBER and FES to work in Florida communities before and after a natural disaster.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Faculty, Masters/PhD students, researchers, emergency responders, local officials, with an expected population the hundreds.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The ROI to the state could be measured in terms of Florida communities that have access to state-of-the-art technologies, planning and design resources, and alignment with implementation funding streams in addition to new students in the field of emergency planning and management.
