14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The communities served by our FRCs experience limited access to resources (especially during natural disasters), along with disproportionate rates of poverty, unemployment/ underemployment, single parent families, and other risk factors associated with abuse. Through multi-system collaborations, our FRC Network brings together partner agencies to increase the community's capacity to support local children and families. Our local children and families deserve the continued support of our FRC Network that many trust as a safe place to seek assistance prior to reaching the crises that may lead to formal child welfare involvement.

- Our Targeted Outcomes are as follows:
- 1. Recruitment of subject matter experts from within the target communities to better serve special populations.
- 2. Addressing the need to build the capacity of our rural FRCs, including recruitment of new partners and volunteers.
- 3. Recruitment of partners to fill potential service gaps, thus increasing our service arra

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Using the evidence-informed Strengthening Families and Protectives Factors Framework, each service offered through our FRC Network is tied to one of five protective factors, which research has shown reduce the risk of child abuse and neglect when present in families. All services are also free of charge to the community thanks to a multi-system collaborative, including more than 80 community partners from across the five sectors. This service network coordination was extremely beneficial to residents of the community during hurricane Idalia.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

We partner with larger entities such as the library district, county government, and grassroots community groups, as well as more than 80 agencies who collaborate with the FRCs to provide services at no cost to families. Services range from concrete supports to financial literacy and employability programs, and children's academic and enrichment programs. Every service offered is tied to one of the five protective factors, which when present in families are shown to reduce the likelihood of abuse or neglect. Each FRC evolves to meet the specific needs of the community it is located within and excels at involving community members in guiding decisions. It is this multi-system collaborative, with representation from across the five sectors (public, business, philanthropy, community, and nonprofit), that has allowed us to blend funding, expand services to meet the needs of our patrons, and enhance the community's ability to leverage resources to benefit populations most in need.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

As documented in PSF's 2022 Family Resource Center Annual Report, our FRC Network had 27,487 patron visits and addressed 36,989 unique service requests. 72% of the services delivered were related to providing concrete supports to assist in reducing poverty and increasing access to resources, resulting in a decreased likelihood of child maltreatment. This number encompasses our entire network of FRCs, however we attended to 12,909 patron visits at our two rural sites in 2022, and anticipate to serve approximately the same number, annually, through this funding opportunity.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Research indicates economic insecurity and material hardship are known contributors to child welfare system involvement. Chapin Hall's Evidence to Impact Tool, a summary of peer-reviewed research related to reducing risk for child maltreatment and child welfare involvement, supports the need for the type of assistance and services provided at FRC's (Chapin Hall, 2023). Through the proposed project, PSF will strengthen and stabilize our existing FRC network, while also building our capacity to serve priority populations. Project outcomes include increasing service provision to special populations, expanding services and programs available within rural communities, and positively impacting the protective factors of our patrons.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

PSF will work with DCF to develop deliverables and project metrics to ensure full scope delivery of this project.
