4. Project/Program Description

Jacksonville School for Autism (JSA) is a not-for-profit private school established in 2005 in support of children and young adults with Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD). Since then the school has seen tremendous growth. JSA started with 2 students and 2 staff and has slowly and intentionally grown to support 60 students with over 50 teachers and therapists! With 1 in 36 children diagnosed with Autism, JSA continues to experience significant growth in student enrollment and program development. A core focus for JSA's Supportive Transition and Employment Placement (STEP) Program is creating transition-supporting, mission-based enterprises. JSA provides job skill training and coaching to young adults with developmental disabilities. These students are from Northeast Florida area including the following counties: Baker, Clay, Duval, Nassau and St. Johns. Through our programs, JSA continues to make a positive impact in the lives of children and families within greater NE Florida.

13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



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JSA's Vocational STEP Program offers students opportunities to explore various job skills, job development/job carving, functional daily living, social skills, and employment coaching.

Funding will support the development and expansion of on-campus enterprises, aligning students' abilities and interests with professional job requirements while addressing individual needs and

overcoming challenges. The program also provides both on-campus and community-based vocational opportunities through strategic partnerships with local organizations.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

JSA seeks funding to develop comprehensive transition initiatives that expand vocational programs and opportunities, providing tailored pathways to nurture each student's unique skills and abilities. The vocational program will support students aged 14 and older by incorporating a practical daily living skills curriculum, maintaining a social and leisure program, and securing essential materials to ensure student success in both classroom and community settings.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The STEP program partners with a diverse range of local businesses, offering services such as confidential shredding, growing and harvesting locally sourced produce, creating art pieces that students can proudly showcase to the community, culinary projects, and more. Our program is dedicated to fostering independence and highlighting the unique abilities of individuals with autism, empowering them to make meaningful contributions beyond the school environment.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The group of people that this project will serve are students age 14 to adulthood. Program participants include current pre-transition, transition, and post-secondary vocation students. JSA serves populations of individuals with autism spectrum disorders (ASD). We enroll individuals from the surrounding counties of Baker, Clay, Duval, Nassau and St. Johns. Our current placement of families crosses all ethnicities and economic backgrounds; autism does not discriminate by whose lives are impacted!

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The expected benefit of JSA's Vocational STEP Program is to provide transition and vocational students with expanded job opportunities, supportive employment placements, and on-campus job enterprises. Our students and young adults have the skills necessary to be successful and productive members in both their home and community; we just need to provide additional resources for them to be able to THRIVE! JSA uses Excel to track skill development over multiple job coaching environments.
