13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

We are respectfully requesting your consideration for support toward our 3 non-profit private schools to continue classes to revive the lives of our teens struggling with addictions. Victory High Schools are in the Tampa Bay area where our students will receive a second chance and a recovery focused education in a healing centered environment with mental health services, and recovery support. Our primary purpose is to save young people's lives! Our goals are to improve school attendance, reduce dropout rates, increase graduation rates, reduce relapse, improve mental health, reduce cost to society and improve emotional wellness and self-regulation.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

We are confident through our wraparound services of mental health services, recovery support and education, we will fill the gaps in services in Tampa Bay for this population of unique young people as well as meet their unmet needs. The most powerful tool to compact isolation with COVID19, Substance Use Disorders, Co-Occurring Disorders and mental illness is connection. Victory High Schools, with your help, will create a safe, healing centered learning environment fostering a sense of connection and will save lives! Our mentorship program is for graduates to receive job coaching and provide mentorship to students.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Our students will be provided a second chance with the following direct services: Academics, Mental Health Counseling, Equine Therapy, Individualized Recovery Plans, Trauma Informed Care, Brain Performance Coaching, Vocational Job Training, Performing Arts Classes, Leadership Training, Expressive Art Therapy, Support Groups, Fitness and Wellness Classes, Peer to Peer Mentorship, Mentors through our Community Leader Lunch N Learns, Yoga, Asset Building Community Development and many more opportunities to set them up for substance free success.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

75 females and males ages 14-19 years old with substance use disorders or co-occurring disorders will receive an education, mental health services, and recovery support. Most of our students are adopted and have had involvement in Florida Department of Children's and Families, Department of Juvenile Justice, and most have co-occurring disorders. Before attending Victory High Schools, our current students have survived 27 drug overdoses, and 15 suicide attempts. Victory High Schools saves lives by addressing their childhood trauma, providing mental health and recovery support so they will earn their diplomas sober!

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Improve attendance for students to be 80% or higher. Attendance will be recorded daily by the teacher. Improve recovery rate centered on long-term abstinence from drugs and alcohol will be 60% or higher. Each student will be randomly drug tested. Results will be documented in file by counselors and reviewed weekly among mentors. Provide youth with effective mental health services, interventions, skills, and treatment with demonstrated success. 90% participation rate of students. Documented in file by Mental Health and Behavioral Specialists.
