13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The purpose of the requested funds is to expand & sustain essential services addressing food insecurity, financial hardship & educational barriers for at-risk & under-served youth in Hillsborough & Pinellas counties. Funding ensures the Food Packs for Kids program continues \$ grows by 420%, providing weekend meals to more children relying on school food. It supports rental & utility assistance, legal aid, career development & mental health services to stabilize vulnerable youth. Educational initiatives like GED prep, financial literacy & mentorship promote long-term self-sufficiency. Resources for young parents, like baby supplies, support & doula services, strengthen their ability to care for their children. Funds also cover transportation, storage, staffing, infrastructure & outreach to expand services, improve efficiency & increase accessibility. This investment provides immediate relief while fostering long-term economic stability & resilience for at-risk youth.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Funds will expand Food Packs for Kids to serve 420% more children across both Hillsborough & Pinellas counties. Rental & utility assistance will prevent homelessness & financial instability. Legal aid will support eviction defense, custody cases, & expungements. Trauma-informed therapy & mental health services will provide professional support to youth in crisis. Young Parent Initiatives will offer resources, education, & support. Community drives will distribute hygiene products, school supplies, toys & holiday meals. FCO funds will provide vehicles, office furniture, & computer equipment for increased service accessibility. Infrastructure for program sustainability will include staffing, technology, marketing, fundraising & logistical support to ensure long-term impact. 10 new jobs, 9 with full benefits, will be created and filled locally to strengthen the economy. These activities & services will ensure at-risk youth receive the resources needed to build stable & successful futures.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Of the \$3.33M requested, 61% will directly fund essential services, including food assistance, rental and utility aid, legal support, GED prep, tutoring, career readiness, scholarships, internships, financial literacy education, doula services, baby supplies, trauma-informed therapy, domestic violence relocation, and community drives providing hygiene items, back-to-school supplies, and holiday meals. Funds will also support job training, mentorship, youth workforce development, educational workshops, wraparound case management, housing navigation, life skills classes, family stabilization support, and access to medical and mental health referrals. 36% will support infrastructure, including salaries, rent, utilities, and program operations to ensure effective service delivery. 3% will fund vehicles and fuel to expand food deliveries, distribute essential supplies, and improve transportation access to critical services, ensuring underserved youth can reach the services we provide.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?



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Programs support at-risk, underserved youth in Hillsborough & Pinellas Counties. 44.1% of households in Hillsborough & 41% in Pinellas live below the ALICE threshold, struggling to afford basic needs (United Way Florida, 2024). In 2022, 17.7% of children in Hillsborough & 15.7% in Pinellas faced food insecurity (FL Dept of Health). Hillsborough County Schools recorded 4,513 homeless students in 2022-2023, while Pinellas County Schools counted 4,752. In 2021, 13.2% of Florida youth had a major depressive episode, with 67% not receiving treatment. In 2021, 25% of Pinellas teens considered suicide or had a plan, & Hillsborough reported similar rates (JWB Pinellas). That year, over 5,500 FL teens gave birth (CDC). Childcare in Hillsborough exceeds a semester at USF, making it unaffordable (WMNF). 625 children are currently fed with Food Packs for Kids, expanding to 1,000 more in each county, for a 420% increase to 2625, while innumerous others will benefit from the various initiatives.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Programs will improve access to food, housing support, education, mental health services & economic resources. Outcomes include improved physical health through food security, reduced stressors & support for young parents. Mental health will improve through stable housing, trauma-informed therapy & supportive relationships. Education programs will enhance academic performance, attendance & access to higher education. Transitioning to eco-friendly packaging & eliminating plastic will enhance environmental sustainability. Economic activity will increase through job creation, financial literacy & workforce training. Recidivism & substance abuse rates will decrease through life skills development, therapy & career pathways. Programs will divert youth from the justice system, strengthen them through engagement & self-sufficiency support & enrich cultural experiences through inclusive, cross-cultural programs. Impact will be measured through program data & relevant data permitted for release
