13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

State funding will support the creation of new programming focused on personal safety and violence prevention through mentoring and career development. WOT mentees are identified as at risk for high school dropout due to challenges such as limited opportunity, domestic abuse, or exposure to addiction, making prevention efforts both life-changing and lifesaving. This targeted curriculum will reach 2,700 at-risk students across Miami-Dade, Broward, and Palm Beach Counties, along with the program's 30,000 alumnae network. Funding will also strengthen WOT's permanent digital content library to ensure ongoing access to high-quality educational resources.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Through expertly designed mentoring sessions, field trips, and summits, mentees will engage with topics such as human trafficking, self-defense, substance abuse prevention, bullying, and cybersecurity, building awareness, critical thinking, and decision-making skills. These experiences will be paired with career exploration in public safety fields, including the military, law enforcement, intelligence, legal professions, emergency management, and criminal investigation.

This initiative will equip mentees with the knowledge and tools to enhance personal safety, strengthen academic and career readiness, and establish clear pathways toward postsecondary education and long-term employment in high-demand public safety sectors.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The Public Safety and Violence Prevention curriculum will be delivered through mentoring sessions, guest speakers, educational videos, expert-led summits, career-focused field trips in law enforcement and the armed forces, and alumnae chapter meetings. The initiative will introduce new violence prevention topics for mentors, mentees, and school coordinators; host career-focused field trips available to all 2,700 South Florida students; and convene county-wide summits featuring expert panels across Miami-Dade, Broward, and Palm Beach Counties. New educational videos will be integrated into mentoring sessions and shared through WOT's video library. A senior career fair will highlight opportunities in public safety, and all new curriculum materials and field trip updates will be accessible through the WOT APP/Portal.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

WOT serves 2,700 students annually across 119 public high schools in Miami-Dade, Broward, and Palm Beach Counties. 95% percent of participants are minority students, and nearly half are the first in their families to pursue higher education. Mentees are selected based on criteria such as risk of high school dropout, exposure to abuse, involvement in criminal activity, or academic challenges.

Despite these risk factors, 99% of WOT mentees graduate from high school, demonstrating the program's proven success in transforming outcomes for vulnerable youth. The WOT Alumnae Program, open to all graduates, extends this support through continued mentorship, career development, and professional guidance. Nearly 90% of mentees report that WOT helped them stay in school and graduate, while 92% say it had a significant impact on their lives, equipping them with the confidence and life skills to build a successful future.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

WOT empowers at-risk students to transform obstacles into opportunities by providing exposure, motivation, and the confidence to create brighter futures for themselves, their families, and their communities. Through targeted mentoring and career-focused experiences, mentees gain the knowledge and life skills to avoid risky behaviors, stay in school, and pursue higher education and meaningful careers.

Program effectiveness will be measured through mentee surveys, graduation and postsecondary enrollment data, and year-end reports from partner school districts. Continuous progress monitoring, through mentor feedback and direct communication with schools, will ensure accountability, data-driven decision-making, and sustained impact across all participating schools.
