13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The Overtown Youth Center College and Career Readiness program aims to increase students' knowledge of college and career options, providing jobs and internships and improving financial literacy. The goal is to develop youth who contribute to a thriving community with a vibrant workforce by ensuring each student is equipped with the tools to succeed and have the ability to impact their communities.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?



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Services include expanding college and career readiness programming to serve youth starting in kindergarten through 12th grade with homework assistance, tutoring, mentoring, STEAM enrichment, ACT/SAT testing preparation, career assessments, college preparation, financial literacy, and internship/job placement.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Coordinators provide ongoing student support using individual case management to track progress towards post-secondary goals. Our services include daily monitoring, mentoring, counseling, and support. Student report cards are collected directly from Miami-Dade County Public Schools to monitor the progress of the students in core academic content areas. An Individual Success Plan (ISP) is used for goal setting and career planning 2-3 times per year. College and Career Readiness Workshops are provided on a weekly basis to engage students in their preparation for post-secondary success.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Funding serves 100 youth in grades K-12 who reside in under-resourced communities throughout South Florida. The program considers factors such as students attending under achieving schools, students from low-income households, those with limited access to college exposure and career readiness opportunities.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The Overtown Youth Center - College and Career Readiness programs are designed to equip students with the essential skills and knowledge needed for post-secondary success and competitive careers. The expected benefits include; Enhanced Academic Proficiency, Increased College Readiness, Career Exploration and Preparation, and the Development of Essential Soft Skills which foster critical thinking, effective communication, and teamwork, which are crucial for success in both academic settings and the workplace.

To measure these outcomes, the project will employ a multi-faceted approach that includes: Individual Case Management and Mentoring, Academic Assessments, Enrichment and Enhancement activities, Skills assessments and ongoing Support Services to address individual student needs related to both academic performance and career planning. This comprehensive methodology ensures that every facet of student development is tracked and measured.
