initiative led by Com strengthening familie court-involved, and la relationships, and ad multi-generational com marriage and family lead to industry-reco	The ADAM (Awesome Dads Awesome Men) Fatherhood Mentoring Program is a comprehensive, evidence-based initiative led by Community Based Connections, Inc. (CBCI), which, for 20 years, has been a nonprofit at the forefront of strengthening families in Broward and Palm Beach Counties. The ADAM program (now in its 13th year) supports at-risk, court-involved, and low-income fathers with a clear goal: reconnect fathers with their children, restore family relationships, and achieve economic stability through employment and skill-building (thus strengthening families, ending multi-generational cycles of neglect). The ADAM program provides: evidence-based parenting education, promotion of marriage and family reunification, individualized case management, and, most critically, workforce training pathways that lead to industry-recognized certifications. If funded, this appropriation will allow CBCI to expand the ADAM program to serve an additional 300+ fathers in Broward and Palm Beach Counties.

13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



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This appropriation, if funded, will be used to expand CBCI's ADAM Program to serve 300+ additional at-risk fathers in Broward and Palm Beach Counties. The specific program goals are strengthening father-child relationships, improving responsible parenting skills, and increasing family stability by reconnecting fathers with their children and equipping them with the tools needed to provide emotional and financial support. Through evidence-based parenting education, case management, workforce training pathways, and family-centered services, the program reduces the risk of child maltreatment, improves co-parenting dynamics, and promotes healthier, more stable households, ending multigeneration cycles of neglect and absence.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

More than 44% of children in the region are born to unwed mothers, and in many communities, fathers are struggling with joblessness, court involvement, or a lack of support. State investment in the ADAM program strengthens traditional families through the promotion of marriage, reduced reliance on social services, supports reentry and workforce reintegration, and ensures fathers can meet their obligations, financial and emotional, to their children. This initiative aligns directly with the state's goals to expand workforce education, support family integrity, and reduce recidivism. The program's fiscal efficiency, community partnerships, and ability to deliver measurable outcomes make it a smart results-driven investment for the state.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The ADAM Program provides a continuum of evidence-based services including individualized case management. parenting and co-parenting education using the 24/7 Dad® and Nurturing Parenting Program curricula, family counseling, and facilitated support groups. Participants engage in structured workshops that promote responsible fatherhood, healthy communication, and emotional bonding with their children. Program staff also collaborate with community, court, and faith-based partners to ensure access, engagement, and retention of eligible fathers.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population for the ADAM Program is low-income, court-involved, and at-risk fathers in Broward and Palm Beach Counties, including those reentering society after incarceration, or mandated to complete parenting programs due to child welfare involvement. The project also serves community-based fathers seeking to strengthen their parenting and family relationships. In its 13 years of existence, the ADAM Program has served 1100+ fathers through direct services, and thousands more through community events and engagement. The program expansion funded by this request is expected to serve an additional 300+ fathers. CBCI and the ADAM Program are also supported by numerous community leaders and private foundations, including the Jim Moran Foundation, Florida Blue, and the Children's Services Council of Broward County.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The ADAM Program's ultimate goal is to strengthen traditional families, reduce generational cycles of neglect and absence, and promote safer, more connected communities. 80% of fathers participating will demonstrate improvement in child support payments, parenting engagement, and family stability; at least 200 will receive workforce certifications; and 150+ placed in employment. These outcomes are evaluated using a comprehensive methodology that includes assessments, detailed case management documentation, and participant progress tracking.
