13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



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Funds are requested to ensure that MCSS' Adult Day Training Program (ADT) provides comprehensive services to approximately 100 low-to-moderate-income participants with intellectual & development disabilities (IDD). Each activity is designed to build independence, self-confidence, & lifelong wellness. Program enhancements include adaptive music therapy, sensory environments & culinary skills training that all promote self expression, emotional regulation & independent living skills. By investing in the ADT Program, the State of Florida will help ensure that up to 100 adults with intellectual & developmental disabilities receive consistent, high-quality services that foster independence, health, & dignity while strengthening family stability, workforce participation, & community resilience.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

The Adult Day Training (ADT) Program operates year-round, Monday through Friday from 8:30am to 2:30pm, providing structured, evidence-based learning experiences that build independence and community integration. During this time participants engage in a holistic schedule of academic enrichment, adaptive vocational instruction, therapeutic recreation, and social-skills development. Each day combines structured learning with individualized support, adapting to each participant's cognitive and physical ability, to reinforce self-reliance, communication and emotional regulation. All activities are delivered within a 1:5 or 1:10 staff-to-participant ratio. These comprehensive services ensure continuity of care, address barriers to access and reduce caregivers stress by providing safe, reliable daytime support for working families

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The Adult Day Training (ADT) Program delivers a full continuum of educational, vocational, therapeutic & wellness support for adults with intellectual & developmental disabilities. This person-centered curriculum empowers participants to build independence, self-advocacy, & community belonging while developing vital life skills. Hands-on activities, such as packaging, sorting, & culinary instruction, provide meaningful vocational experience, while daily fitness, yoga, swimming, & recreation strengthen both body & mind. Art & music therapy nurture emotional well-being, complemented by community engagement through volunteer projects, art exhibitions & the Special Olympics. Each participant receives a hot, nutritious lunch, along with weekly equine therapy. All services build confidence, stability, & lifelong wellness, empowering adults with IDD to thrive while giving families relief & strengthening the community's circle of care.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Expected benefits include measurable improvements in behavioral and emotional health, greater vocational readiness, enhanced independence, and stronger caregiver stability. MCSS will track the following outcomes annually: = 90 % participant retention reflecting consistent attendance & engagement; = 90 % of families affirming that the program fosters independence & self-discipline; = 90 % of families affirming that the program supports participants' social & emotional growth; maintenance of = 90 % State of Florida compliance rating for program operations & participant safety. Program outcomes are measured through annual family surveys, state assessments, and internal progress tracking tools. By investing in TMC's ADT Program, the State not only provides health and safety services for the participant but also addresses workforce and economic stability strategy for Florida.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Expected benefits include measurable improvements in behavioral and emotional health, greater vocational readiness, enhanced independence, and stronger caregiver stability. MCSS will track the following outcomes annually: = 90 % participant retention reflecting consistent attendance & engagement; = 90 % of families affirming that the program fosters independence & self-discipline; = 90 % of families affirming that the program supports participants' social & emotional growth; maintenance of = 90 % State of Florida compliance rating for program operations & participant safety. Program outcomes are measured through annual family surveys, state assessments, and internal progress tracking tools.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for in the contract?

Marian Center School & Services' Adult Day Training Program earned a 92.7% compliance rating from the State of Florida's Agency for Persons with Disabilities in 2025, demonstrating strong operational integrity and accountability. The program has a long-standing record of meeting or exceeding all contract performance measures. In the unlikely event that deliverables are not met, MCSS recommends a structured Corrective Action Plan (CAP) developed in partnership with the contracting agency. The CAP would include measurable benchmarks and timelines to ensure compliance prior to the release of any future funds.
