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BOOST is a Job Skills training and placement program for persons with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) and related disabilities. The Boca Raton Achievement Center is dedicated to helping teens and young adults with developmental disabilities learn the skills they need to successfully navigate a productive and independent adult life. The BOOST program focuses on teaching and training participants the necessary hard and soft skills and providing necessary supports to obtain and maintain employment.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

The BOOST program will hone employment skills from a wide range of vocations, both on-campus and in the community, and includes comprehensive components to prepare participants for productivity and success in the workforce. BOOST includes job training, employment coaching, scheduling, interviewing, appropriate communication skills, generalization of skills to multiple environments, transportation and financial literacy.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

community and promote acceptance and inclusion in a variety of occupations. Also, explore opportunities and training in small business creation and production of retail products and services, such as shredding, recycling, assembly, art and greeting cards, soap, candles, gardening, IT, etc.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Up to 50 individuals with Autism, physical, developmentally and intellectually disabled, high school and young adult participants.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Job training to increase chances of employment and provide income, self-sufficiency and increased commerce. Getting individuals with autism and related disabilities out of their homes and working in the community inspire many to patronize those businesses and support their independence. Many participants who are not excelling academically often have other skills and talents in addition to acute perseverance. Exploring other abilities and preferences to increase participants desire to perform certain jobs helps them become more proficient in targeted job skills. All training, performance and placement metrics will be tracked monthly with quarterly progress updates and an annual program report.
