#### 13. Program Performance

#### a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

Congregate Meals: Funds requested to provide hot meals to participants in a senior center environment who will maintain or improve their nutrition score and prevent social isolation.

Home Delivered Meals: Funds requested to deliver frozen meals to frail, homebound elderly who will also maintain or improve their nutrition score.

Emergency Meals: Funds requested to provide emergency meals in preparation of a natural disaster or hurricane. Respite: Funds requested to ensure that caregivers can continue to provide the primary care for the frail, homebound elderly which will mitigate state and community resources from being utilized while keeping the older adult living in their community.

#### b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Congregate Meals: 21,020 congregate meals will be provided to 200 unduplicated elderly persons 60 years of age or

Home Delivered Meals: 13.195 home delivered meals will be provided to 60 unduplicated elderly homebound persons 60 years of age or older.

Emergency Meals: 938 emergency meals will be provided to 188 unduplicated elderly persons 60 years of age or

Respite: An estimated 45 caregivers will receive approximately 7,822 hours of respite services, at an average of 2 hours of respite care per day, 2 times per week. Direct care includes assistance with bathing, light household chores, and companionship. These activities provide the caregiver with respite from the day-to-day activities of caring for a frail, homebound adult 60 years of age or older.

#### c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Congregate Meals: Funds requested will be used to provide 21,020 congregate meals to 200 unduplicated senior center participants.

Home Delivered Meals: Funds will be used to provide 13,195 home delivered meals to 60 unduplicated homebound elderly participants.

Emergency Meals: Funds will be used to provide 938 emergency meals to 188 unduplicated elderly participants in preparation of a natural disaster or hurricane.

Respite: Funds will be used to provide to 45 caregivers 7,822 hours of respite care services in their homes.

#### d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Congregate Meals: Elderly persons 60 years of age or older. Approximately 200 individuals are expected to be served. Home Delivered Meals: Frail, homebound elderly clients 60 years of age or older. Approximately 60 individuals are expected to receive one (1) frozen meal a day, 5 days a week. Eligibility is defined by the DOEA Program and Services

Emergency Meals: Congregate and Home Delivered Meal clients 60 years of age or older. Approximately 188 individuals are expected to receive emergency meals.

Respite: An estimated 45 caregivers of frail, homebound elderly persons 60 years of age or older are expected to receive respite services.

#### e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?



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Congregate Meals: Outcome: 66% of clients receiving meals will maintain or improve their nutrition score. Methodology: Compare initial assessment score to annual reassessment score utilizing the DOEA Uniform Assessment Tool 701.

Home Delivered Meals: Outcome: 65% of clients receiving meals will maintain or improve their nutrition score. Methodology: Compare initial assessment score to annual reassessment score utilizing the DOEA Uniform Assessment Tool 701.

Respite: Outcome 1: 65% of clients ADL/IDL score is maintained or improved. Methodology: DOEA client assessment/reassessment score comparison. Outcome 2: 89% of family and family assisted caregivers are very likely to provide care to their loved ones with this service. Methodology: satisfaction surveys.
