13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

This request will support food access coordination and resilience in Districts 38, focusing on the most vulnerable areas and populations and increasing the reach of critical nutrition resources. Through direct support, calendar/map systems, partner-led programming, and community-led outreach, this work addresses gaps in service delivery and ensures families can access healthy food, in their neighborhoods, especially in times of need.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

The FNFA initiative will strengthen local food systems and improve nutrition access by upgrading infrastructure at six food access sites (e.g., pantries, farms, hubs); hosting 24+ Wellness Days featuring food distributions, preventive health screenings, and nutrition education; supporting six culturally tailored nutrition workshops and six garden-based learning sessions; sustaining a countywide Community Food Finder platform (directory, calendar, and map); awarding \$150,000 in mini-grants to grassroots organizations; and advancing shared data infrastructure and coordination across sectors. All services will prioritize vulnerable communities in the region.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The appropriation will directly support residents by expanding access to free, healthy food through coordinated distributions, community fridges, and gardens; offering culturally grounded nutrition education and health screenings; providing real-time resource navigation through the FNFA Community Food Finder tool; and funding local organizations that deliver essential food relief services. These efforts will prioritize food-insecure communities across Senate District 38 and throughout the region.

This project will improve food and nutrition access for residents in Miami-Dade, especially in District 38. It will support partners in hosting food distributions, provide 10+ mini-grants for community-based services, and expand the FNFA Community Food Finder to help residents locate free food and support. Impact will be measured through the number of residents reached, events held, and partner activities, along with survey feedback and usage data from the Food Finder platform.
