### 13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

Over the course of the term of the contract the requested funds will support Life N Balance by FEC, a community-based health and wellness initiative led by certified health workers. Through workshops and one-on-one engagement, participants managing diabetes, hypertension, and high cholesterol will gain knowledge and preventative strategies to reduce complications, improve long-term outcomes, cut indigent care costs, and save taxpayer dollars.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Life N Balance by FEC will deliver workshops on chronic disease management, distribute tailored education, and provide on-site screenings for glucose and blood pressure. Participants will receive individualized health & wellness consultations, supported by community outreach and recruitment. Program impact will be measured through data-driven evaluation and surveys to ensure outcomes and accountability.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The appropriation project will provide citizens with direct health screenings for diabetes, hypertension, and cholesterol; individualized consultations with community health workers; distribution of tailored educational materials; interactive workshops on prevention and management; and accessible outreach to connect families with resources that improve long-term health outcomes.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population includes uninsured, underinsured, and at-risk individuals in underserved communities who are managing or at risk for diabetes, hypertension, and high cholesterol. The project is expected to directly serve approximately 500–600 individuals annually through screenings, workshops, and consultations. Special emphasis will be placed on reaching populations with limited access to preventive care and health education resources.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The expected outcome is improved long-term health for individuals managing diabetes, hypertension, and high cholesterol, with reduced reliance on emergency care and lower indigent care costs. Outcomes will be measured through pre- and post-program health screenings, participant surveys, and data analysis on knowledge gains, behavioral changes, and healthcare utilization.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for in the contract?

The contracting agency should consider graduated corrective actions such as withholding a percentage of payments until deliverables are met, requiring a corrective action plan with defined timelines, reducing future funding allocations. These measures reinforce accountability while supporting performance improvement.
