13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

We envision a world where single mothers in need who are facing homelessness can be given the opportunity to learn how to competently provide a safe, healthy environment for their children. CityHouse is premised on the research that strengthening the family unit can prevent children from entering the child welfare system. While many local organizations provide care to families or children post foster-care placement, CityHouse offers a proactive response. We prevent it by providing front-end services that enhance and strengthen the family unit by providing tools for healthy living. We believe this type of intervention will lead to systemic change throughout South Florida, creating a healthier community for generations to come.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

CityHouse is a one-to-two-year program that offers safe and affordable housing, wrap-around services, daily mentoring, educational opportunities, mental health services, and skill-building opportunities. We focus on empowering our mothers to live healthier lives through education, community, and career development offering a holistic approach to each family's multifaceted needs. Our program is designed to instill life-changing skills, values, and character into the families we serve.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Affordable housing lays the foundation for mothers to gain steps towards autonomy and for children to achieve steps towards successful futures. Single-family apartments in a community setting are newly renovated, fully furnished, and stocked with necessities, such as toiletries. Residents are responsible for a small amount of rental expenses, equaling about 30 percent of a full-time, minimum wage salary. We apply a strengths-based philosophy throughout our services, focused on resilience and resourcefulness. Our clinical social work team provide therapeutic services and increase access to community resources. Food assistance, transportation, and daycare are secured upon intake. A treatment plan with specific goals for each mother and each child is developed upon intake and is updated quarterly throughout their time in the program. Financial literacy, parenting, career development support, spiritual enrichment, and other life and social skill building classes are offered.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Homeless mothers and children have extremely complex needs. Studies show a variety of factors that need to be addressed, including mental health, physical health, development, and safety. The "Homeless Children: America's New Outcasts" report indicates 92% of homeless mothers have experienced severe assaults (physical or sexual). Homeless mothers have an alarming rate of mental health and emotional problems, including depression. Homeless children are four times more likely to have developmental delays than other children. Children who are placed in foster care are at risk for becoming a homeless family as adults. This report also predicts that family homelessness will increase, which makes our program a necessary option for families seeking to break the cycle.

Total Number of Families and Individuals Served: 60 individuals. CiyHouse Residential Program: 20 families (20 mothers, 40 children)

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

We utilize individual treatment plans and clinical evaluation tools to assess self-sufficiency, and each families' readiness to sustain independence. Financial support is provided to help secure independent housing, and services are assessed and provided through the transition and stabilization process. We challenge our mothers to learn and become empowered to successfully live beyond their time at CityHouse. Due to our overarching goal to have long standing changes, we conduct follow-up evaluations with program graduates through the structure of our Alumni Care Program. The Alumni Care Program offers continued access to services and support over a five-year, step-down program to ensure graduates transition well into independent and healthy living. Our evaluations have consistently shown that graduates exit our program with the ability to provide for their families well beyond the scope of basic needs.
