13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The specific purpose is to transform the County-operated Sports Events Center into a versatile, multi-sport championship facility, maximizing its economic utility and tourist draw. The funds will achieve this by procuring a portable wood floor, integrated sound system, and bleacher seating, immediately enabling the facility to attract collegiate level and court sports. Hosting these cornerstone multi-sport events will significantly increase sports tourism traffic, maximizing hotel occupancy, and driving tangible economic benefits throughout Alachua County and the surrounding region.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

County staff will provide professional management services and marketing of the facility. The team will coordinate the scheduling and rental of the facility for collegiate and professional level events made possible by the new court-based assets. These services fully integrate the Sports Events Center into the wider tourism and hospitality offerings of Alachua County.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The appropriation will support services related to year-round sports tourism and event hosting in a facility capable of providing multiple court sports alongside track and field. The facility also serves as an ideal venue for local events, trade shows, conventions, and concerts. This ensures a world-class, multi-functional venue, built to Class A institutional quality, remains available for local youth practices, adult leagues, and community programming during off-peak times.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population is two-fold: out-of-county sports tourists (athletes, coaches, and spectators) attending high-profile weekend events, and local residents utilizing the facility for weekday practices and community events. Based on established economic modeling, the fully functional, versatile facility is expected to see an annual attendance of approximately 752,000 visits, with out-of-county visitors accounting for at least 54% of annual attendance, resulting in over 116,000 new annual hotel room nights.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The expected outcome is a significant and measurable increase in sports tourism revenue, achieved by allowing the Sports Events Center (SEC) to better compete with out-of-state rivals in markets like Birmingham, Alabama, and Myrtle Beach, South Carolina. The \$500,000 investment in a portable collegiate level court system, sound system, and bleachers is critical to achieving competitive parity, enabling the SEC to successfully attract collegiate and professional level court-based events that it cannot currently host. The primary mechanism to judge success will be the impact on the hotel, tourism, and overall occupancy of the facility. This project is estimated to help generate over \$77 million per year in total economic impact and add 1,150 jobs to the surrounding community. Success will be measured by the review of guarterly and annual financial statements, facility occupancy rates, and annual hotel room night generation.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for in the contract?

The County commits to reporting on performance measures established in the contract, including event booking rates and generated hotel room nights. The State of Florida will review quarterly and annual financial statements which tie directly to the economic health of the facility and community benefits. Should performance metrics fall short, the County will commit to providing a rectification plan to the funding agency, detailing operational changes to meet the projected economic impact outcomes.
