	Florida State University (FSU) proposes an expansion and renovation of the Middleton Center for the Dedman College of Hospitality, and other FSU activities at the FSU property adjacent to the FSU College of Engineering. The project will support and grow FSU Dedman College of Hospitality programs and other hospitality-education related functions. The requested funding would be used to plan and design the remodel of the Middleton Center as well as initiating planning and design for a new building on this site that would house educational and administrative space for the FSU Dedman College of Hospitality, as well as additional facilities for FSU programming. The proposed project will support academic excellence, innovative teaching methods, and foster community benefiting FSU faculty and students, as well as the broader Tallahassee and Florida communities.

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



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The funds will be used to plan and design the expansion and renovation of the Middleton Center, providing enhanced educational, administrative, and meeting spaces for the Dedman College of Hospitality. The goal is to support academic excellence, foster innovation and collaboration, and create spaces that prepare students for 21st-century careers while benefiting the broader Tallahassee and Florida communities.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

The funds will be used for planning and designing the expansion and renovation of the Middleton Center. Specific activities include upgrading classrooms and labs to support hands-on hospitality training and experiential learning. New administrative and educational spaces will be created for the Dedman College of Hospitality, including specialized areas for hospitality technology and interprofessional curricula. Renovations will also include the enhancement of meeting and event spaces for academic, athletic, and community functions. Additionally, the project will incorporate green building strategies to ensure sustainability.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The appropriation project will provide direct services by enhancing educational opportunities for students at FSU. The renovated Middleton Center will offer upgraded classrooms and training facilities for the Dedman College of Hospitality, supporting the growth of academic programs. The renovated Middleton Center will provide infrastructure to support expansion of new and existing educational programs in hospitality and will foster interprofessional education to train club management and other hospitality professions. The revamped space will allow FSU to prepare generations of hospitality professionals, many of whom will work in Florida and directly benefit the Florida economy involved in the large and growing hospitality and recreational industry.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population served by this project is FSU students, specifically those enrolled in the Dedman College of Hospitality and related programs. The expansion and renovation will accommodate the current 618 students, with the capacity to support future growth. The project is expected to serve an increased number of students through expanded undergraduate and graduate programs, including the Global Club Management and Leadership major.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The remodeling of the current Middleton Center will be a fundamental step in the further development of the academic and athletic programs of FSU, growing the numbers of graduates that directly contribute to the Florida economy through their leadership and participation in the large and important hospitality and recreation sectors. These expanded facilities will also serve to promote tourism in Tallahassee. The new and extensively remodeled facilities will provide long-lasting impact on economic development, accelerate innovation, expand educational opportunities, create community leaders of the future, and provide an important axis serving Tallahassee community need. The level of benefit will be measured through enrollment growth in the Dedman College of Hospitality, tracking increases beyond the current 618 students. Graduation rates and job placement data will assess the programs impact, with a focus on hospitality industry employment.
