13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The requested funds will expand access to high-quality civic literacy and speech and debate programs across Florida, eliminating the geographic gaps that prevent students in many regions from participating. This investment will equip K–20 students with essential life skills, confidence, critical thinking, and effective communication, while promoting civil discourse, patriotism, and a deeper understanding of our founding principles. The initiative also strengthens academic outcomes, improving Social Studies, ELA, and ELP performance in participating districts.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

The requested funds will support the Florida Debate Initiative's statewide civic literacy and speech and debate programs across all 67 school districts, including American Dream Debates for ESOL students, the Veterans Day Speech Contest, Salute to Service, ProCamp for varsity competitors, DebatEd 101 and 201 for new and advanced coaches, Middle School Camp, High School Camp, the Summer Coach Retreat, the Civics Immersion trip to Washington, D.C., and the FDI Fellows college internship program. These funds will allow FDI to run tournaments, train and support coaches, expand access in rural and high-need areas, provide rehabilitation-focused programming in DJJ facilities, and deliver the communication, leadership, and civic learning experiences that improve academic outcomes and ensure equitable opportunities for students statewide.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The project will provide students across Florida with direct access to speech and debate instruction, civic literacy education, competitive debate opportunities, debate camps, leadership and civics immersion experiences, coach and teacher training, and rehabilitative debate programming for youth in DJJ facilities. These services give students essential skills in communication, critical thinking, and civic engagement, and ensure that youth in all 67 school districts, including ESOL, rural, high-need, and justice-involved students, receive meaningful educational enrichment and academic support.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population includes K–20 students across all 67 Florida school districts—approximately 2.8 million students, each of whom has access to the Florida Debate Initiative's statewide programs and services. Direct participants include ESOL students, rural and high-need communities, middle and high school speech and debate students, participants in programs such as American Dream Debates, the Veterans Day Speech Contest, Salute to Service, ProCamp, and debate camps, as well as novice and advanced coaches and justice-involved youth in DJJ facilities. Across all programs, the project is expected to directly serve more than 25,000 students and over 1,500 educators annually, with statewide access available to all.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The project will improve civic literacy, communication skills, critical thinking, and academic performance for students across all 67 districts, while expanding access to high-quality speech and debate programs for ESOL students, rural and high-need communities, and justice-involved youth. Outcomes will be measured through student participation data, academic indicators, pre- and post-assessments, coach evaluations, DJJ behavioral measures, and statewide access tracking. The assessment process will be established by the FDOE.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for in the contract?
