a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



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MPACT is seeking funds to acquire and renovate a 31,000+ square-foot addition to our campus. This expansion will significantly enhance our ability to deliver high-quality special needs education, therapy services, workforce development, and inclusive community programming in one centralized, secure location. With this acquisition, IMPACT Academy will increase enrollment from the current 25/26 school year enrollment of 67 to 115-120 students, providing more children with access to individualized education in a supportive environment. The expansion will also reduce therapeutic wait times for hundreds of families currently seeking occupational, physical, speech, ABA, and music therapy. This investment will create a sustainable, long-term resource for children and young adults with developmental and learning differences within the 13 counties we serve.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

With this funding, we will acquire the physical space needed to offer physical, occupational, speech, and applied behavior analysis therapy services to even more families, while increasing our Academy enrollment from the current 25/26 school year enrollment of 67 to 115-120 students. This investment will allow IMPACT to create a fully integrated "Town Center" featuring on-site retail storefronts providing training and workforce opportunities for young adults with special needs. Through partnerships with local businesses and community organizations, this space will provide meaningful, hands-on learning that promotes independence, self-confidence, and social growth. Ultimately, this expansion will position IMPACT Tallahassee as a national model for inclusive and experiential learning.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

An increase in educational opportunities with the addition of classrooms and additional space that will provide enhanced experiential learning environments for our students. Our individualized physical, occupational, speech and applied behavior analysis therapy services will be expanded with this funding to provide the best possible outcomes for each family. Funding will also allow expansion to our after-school programs as well providing more summer camp opportunities for our growing community.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Developmentally and physically disabled youth from the ages of 6 weeks to 22 years of age. Persons with poor mental and physical health including preschool, grade, and high school students. IMPACT also serves young adults who are post high-school in our transition program up to 22 years of age. IMPACT will have provided more than 50,000 total hours of therapies to 550+ families in 2025 alone. The demand for our services continues to increase each year.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

IMPACT will be able to serve a broader population of families improving their physical & mental health, instill career readiness for students after graduation, and provide meaningful career opportunities, as we hire more staff to work with additional children & young adults. This space also includes dedicated spaces for mentorship, counseling, and daily life skills training to support young adults as they transition into adulthoods. The methodology to measure these benefits includes baseline standard periodic testing, school & therapeutic assessment tracking, workforce training assessment tool, career placement following graduation, and tracking of independent living skills.
