4. Project/Program Description

The 4KIDS Prevention, Foster Family Recruitment & Hope 4 Healing Project is a multi-pronged approach to bring Hope, Homes and Healing to children and families. It is designed to 1) Keep children who are at risk of entering the foster care system at home through CarePortal services; 2) Recruit new foster families; and 3) Provide exceptional placement stability. Since 1997, 4KIDS has licensed over 1500 foster families through our recruitment efforts. 4KIDS' wraparound support to our foster children and families includes: EPIC evidence-based therapeutic services and parent training, foster parent support staff and volunteers who provide an array of events and support services. Together this allows for higher placement stability and greater healing for children in foster care.

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13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The 4KIDS Prevention, Foster Family Recruitment & Hope 4 Healing Project will support prevention with CarePortal, the recruitment, licensing and support of foster families in FY 2026-2027, resulting in up to 100 new foster families and ultimately reducing the number of children in group care in circuits 11, 15, 17, 19 and 20. Additionally, this project will positively affect the stability of existing foster care placements resulting in a stability rate of 3.09 or less moves per 1,000 days in care (a 25% reduction in moves compared to the current State of Florida goal of 4.12).

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

The 4KIDS Community Engagement Team will continue to build partnerships with local churches and research new opportunities to engage the church community to recruit foster families. The team will engage, educate, and encourage potential foster families through meetings, presentations, etc. regarding the need for foster parents. The CarePortal team will train and equip church leaders and congregants to meet tangible needs and to serve families who are at risk of having their children removed. Additionally, the EPIC team will provide trauma informed mental health services which will include counseling to the children and family members as well as training to parents and caregivers to prepare them to better serve children who have experienced trauma.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The Prevention, Foster Family Recruitment & Hope 4 Healing Project will result in the provision of more quality foster homes for children who have suffered from abuse, abandonment, and neglect. Children will be safe and living in a healthy environment. Additionally, children and families who are a part of the foster and adoptive family unit will receive trauma-informed therapeutic care, at no cost to them, even if they have no insurance or are under insured. We will provide therapy services, therapeutic training and support groups annually to all 4KIDS families. This will have a positive impact on the placement stability as foster families will feel more supported and able to handle the difficulties that come with caring for children from hard places. Additionally we will work to keep children who are at risk of being placed into the foster care system at home through CarePortal services.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The Prevention, Foster Family Recruitment & Hope 4 Healing Project will serve children between the ages of 0-17 entering and currently in foster care in circuits 11, 15, 17, 19 and 20. An estimated 125 children will be served by up to 100 new foster families created by the project in FY 2026-2027. Children and families who are a part of the foster and adoptive family unit will receive trauma-informed therapeutic care, at no cost to them, even if they have no insurance or are under insured. We will provide therapy services, therapeutic training for parents and support groups annually to 4KIDS families. And, we will help to keep children 0-17, who are at risk of being placed into the foster care system at home through CarePortal services.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

This project will lead to the licensing of up to 100 new foster families in circuits 11, 15, 17, 19 & 20. The project will also benefit licensed foster and adoptive families by supporting them through therapeutic services, child therapy and family therapy, at no cost to them. 4KIDS expects the placement stability rate of families receiving therapeutic care will improve as compared to the current State goal of 4.12 to no more than 3.09 moves per 1,000 days in care. 4KIDS' Extended Reach database will be used to record and measure our ability to achieve the intended outcomes. We will also serve over 2,500 children who are at risk of being removed from their families by providing tangible goods (i.e., cribs, beds, car seats, clothes, etc.) through CarePortal services. The financial benefit to Florida can be enormous. Research from the University of North Carolina's Jordan Institute for Families found that group placements cost 7 to 10 times the cost of placing a child with a family.
