13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

By recognizing the emotional complexities inherent in police work and developing resources to offer genuine support, SPC is delivering a compelling message: the health and safety of our communities are intrinsically linked to the mental and emotional well-being of our police officers and other first responders, such as fire and rescue as well as dispatchers. This is achieved by equipping them with the resilience tools they need to foster a safer environment for everyone. Creating and implementing a new model for wellness will allow leaders in law enforcement and among first responders to tackle the stigma associated with seeking mental health support.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Since the program's inception, the attention of the program has garnered state and national interest from other agencies who would like to refer their first responders to the program. With cohort #2 in full swing, the demographic make-up of these 12 first responders represent St. Pete PD, Tampa PD, Bradenton PD, and Tampa Airport. The program is currently recruiting for cohort #3 to deploy in Fall 2025 with a concurrent cohort #1 of Fire & Rescue, EMS, and dispatchers to start in Summer 2026.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

First responder programs in Florida benefit the community by providing crucial support to those who serve and by improving the overall well-being of the first responders themselves. These programs offer mental health resources, financial assistance, and other forms of support, ultimately leading to a healthier and stronger first responder workforce. By supporting the well-being of first responders, programs ensure they can provide efficient and effective emergency response services, leading to better outcomes for individuals and communities they serve.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Expanding to all EMS, Fire, 911 and Police in the State of Florida. When compared to the general population, first responders are more at risk for mental illness. In a 2018 report published by the Ruderman Family Foundation, emergency medical services professionals, firefighters and law enforcement officers experienced heightened levels of depression, post-traumatic stress disorder and suicidal thoughts, and they were more likely to die by suicide than in the line of duty. According to data gathered by First H.E.L.P., an organization seeking to reduce the stigma surrounding mental health for first responders, there were 252 reported suicides by first responders.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The launch of the Mental Health Certificate program at St. Petersburg College marks a significant advancement in our community, showcasing a forward-thinking approach to prioritizing the mental health of police officers. We hope that this initiative will serve as a blueprint for other jurisdictions, encouraging them to collaborate with educational institutions to address this vital need. By recognizing the emotional complexities inherent in police work and developing resources to offer genuine support, SPC is delivering a compelling message: the health and safety of our communities are intrinsically linked to the mental and emotional well-being of our police officers and other first responders, such as fire and rescue as well as dispatchers.
