4. Project/Program Description

The City has been investing millions of dollars in the hardening of its community with the conversion of overhead power lines to improve the aesthetics and safety, generate more tax revenues, enhance commercial growth, and bolster resiliency efforts, all of which are immediately realized with objective proof of success. The entire south end of the City has been hardened by removing all poles and utility lines, which expedited the recovery from storm events at a substantially faster rate. Property owners and commercial establishments were immediately able to begin restoring their properties since power was more quickly made available. FPL found they had less damage to its utility infrastructure since it was buried and protected from the hurricanes. The OH lines prevented redevelopment of pre-firm structures to larger FEMA-compliant structures.

13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



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SR 789/Gulf Drive is the only means for visitors and residents to get on and off Anna Maria Island. Burying lines eliminates weather-related power outages and provides more reliable service and greater resiliency per SB 796 - 366.96, Fla. Stat. Safety and Community Health. Burying lines eliminates fire hazards, accidents, and safety risks from power outages due to downed lines. There have been two house fires and an electrocution from past hurricanes in the City from power lines. Following Hurricane Ian, the City was the first barrier island city on Anna Maria to have its power restored due to the 2019 \$2,000,000 State Appropriation and recovery for FPL and home/business owners was much quicker following hurricanes Helene and Milton.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

The complete conversion of current aerial facilities to underground. This includes the design, materials, construction, wreck-out of aerial facilities, and construction management. This project will have a dual benefit of creating a corridor of usable property without the need for property acquisition by the FDOT for the Complete Streets Project. The City of Bradenton Beach will acquire all easements and land acquisitions needed for the underground conversion and the impending FDOT Cortez SR789 Bridge Replacement.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Safer, more aesthetic & reliable system. Reduces the risk of limited mobility as a result of storm events/damage. Improve resiliency for power service to the residential and tourist barrier island community. The City of Bradenton Beach has become the staging site for after-storm first responders & FPL crews following the past few hurricane seasons due to the underground work in the South end of the City, which has allowed the south end and its business district to continue service with power. This will also eliminate the fires and electrocutions occurring from storm-downed lines. There have been two house fires in the City & an electrocution from past hurricane seasons on the north end where the power lines remain.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Elderly, residents, businesses, tourists, and students. The City is mostly tourist populated with approximately 80% of the residences being rentals. In fiscal year 2023, 3.8 million visitors generated 2.2 billion dollars in Manatee County.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

FDOT/FPL will save over \$1,000,000 for the work Bradenton Beach will do in preparation for the Cortez Bridge and Complete Streets with relocation of overhead lines, equipment, landscaping obstruction removal and securing of public ROW/Easements. Immeasurable benefit of providing a safe evacuation route from the Barrier Island for Bradenton Beach and Longboat Key along SR 789. Benefit of keeping power on during storm events for a tourist-driven area will increase visitors and tourist dollars to the area. The benefit of removing the power lines from the rights-of-way in very limited real estate (barrier island developed in 1957) provides huge opportunities to install stormwater drainage, wider and safer pedestrian and bicycle corridors.

The City will consider liquidated damages or other related terms to hold the Contractor responsible for schedule delays. The City will return unused funds to the State.
