a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

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The Village of Islamorada would like to extend student pedestrian paths from the 3 school properties on Plantation Key that lead into the adjacent neighborhoods. Currently, students walk along paved shoulders, which run along either the Old Highway or the primary access road into highest residential neighborhood. Adding separated paths will buffer the students from vehicle traffic, extend existing school property sidewalks, and connect the elementary/middle school and high school via an existing crosswalk. This project would add 4,050 feet of separated pedestrian facilities or sidewalks between the 3 locations. Portions of this project were identified in the 2007 Village Bike/Ped Master Plan. The Village is actively pursuing an updated plan through the USDOT Safety Action Plan grant program, and this project is expected to be an identified safety priority.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Extension of existing school sidewalks into Village right of way to provide separation for students walking to and from the adjacent residential neighborhoods.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Increased safety for student pedestrians through delineated buffers separating student walking paths from local and visitor traffic.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Students attending Plantation Key Elementary/Middle School, Coral Shores High School, and Treasure Village Montessori School. The adjacent neighborhoods, of which next to Plantation Key Elementary/Middle school has one of the highest residential populations in the Village. 4,945 residents out of the total 7,000 residents in the Village live on Plantation Key, where the three schools are located. Of which, 15% are under the age of 18.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The expected benefits are increased safety, and reduced stress of students walking those routes currently. Surveys can be conducted after construction to measure the increased feeling of safety, and data will monitored though the tentative Safety Action Plan.

Liquidated damages for delayed construction and required warranty for work provided.
