13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

These funds will be used to administer technology that allows strengthened collaboration between retailers and law enforcement, by providing real-time actionable intelligence on organized retail crime offenders and criminal activity occurring in Florida's retail stores. This collaboration contributes to safer communities and safer shopping environments by reducing both property crime and the violence that often accompanies it. This tool helps law enforcement and prosecutors pursue more serious charges (e.g., felony theft, racketeering) rather than treating crimes as unremarkable isolated incidents.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Funds will be used to contract with a third-party vendor to provide and maintain an intelligence-sharing platform in support of the Florida Organized Retail Crime Exchange (FORCE). This secure platform currently supports collaboration among retail, law enforcement, and prosecutors with more than 1,200 users statewide. The program is designed to strengthen the public-private partnership between retailers and law enforcement through real-time intelligence exchange in the fight against organized retail crime (ORC). By centralizing data and facilitating cross-jurisdictional collaboration, this technology supports the successful investigation and prosecution of complex ORC cases that cross local and regional boundaries.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

This service leads to enhanced public safety, and safe and secure retail environments by reducing violent incidents associated with organized retail crime. These services also protect consumer costs as retail theft drives up prices for consumers. By reducing ORC losses, the platform helps mitigate the "theft tax" that gets passed on to citizens in the form of higher prices. ORC networks are often linked to other crimes (drug trafficking, human trafficking, weapons offenses). Disrupting ORC contributes to dismantling broader criminal enterprises that threaten communities, employees, and even customers who may be caught in dangerous theft incidents.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The FORCE intelligence sharing platform is currently utilized statewide by retailers, state and local law enforcement agencies, local prosecutors, and the Office of the Attorney General. The technology is currently in use by over 1,200 users statewide representing over 150 retail brands, and 120 law enforcement agencies.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The project is expected to continue to foster increased collaboration and intelligence sharing between law enforcement agencies and retailers statewide resulting in decreased retail theft and successful prosecution of cross-jurisdictional organized retail crime cases. The outcome will be measured by monitoring of data sharing analytics and documentation of successful case prosecutions that are facilitated or enhances by the use of the platform.
