19	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:
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21	Section 1. School Readiness Commission
22	(1) The School Readiness Commission is established and
23	assigned to the Executive Office of the Governor for
24	administrative purposes. The commission shall carry out the
25	duties and responsibilities provided in this section and
26	delegated by the State Board of Education and is not subject
27	to control, supervision, or direction by the Executive Office
28	of the Governor or the State Board of Education. The
29	commission shall serve as an advisory body to the State Board
30	of Education and other appropriate state agencies and entities
31	on all matters relating to achievement of the first state
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1 education goal, readiness to start school. In addition, the 2 commission's reports and recommendations shall be made 3 available to the Governor, the Legislature, the State Board of 4 Education, other appropriate state agencies and entities, 5 district school boards, central agencies for child care, and 6 county public health units. 7 The commission shall be composed of 12 members of (2)8 the public who shall be business, community, and civic leaders 9 in the state who are not elected to public office and who do 10 not earn their income in the early education and child care 11 industry. The members must be geographically and 12 demographically representative of the state. Each member shall 13 be appointed by the Governor. Eight of the members shall be 14 appointed from a list of 12 nominees, of which six must be 15 submitted by the President of the Senate and six must be 16 submitted by the Speaker of the House of Representatives. 17 Members shall be appointed to 4-year terms of office. However, 18 of the initial appointees, three shall be appointed to 1-year 19 terms, three shall be appointed to 2-year terms, three shall 20 be appointed to 3-year terms, and three shall be appointed to 21 4-year terms. The members of the commission shall elect a 22 chairperson annually. Any vacancy on the commission shall be 23 filled in the same manner as the original appointment. 24 The commission shall meet as often as it deems (3) 25 necessary to carry out its duties and responsibilities. 26 The commission shall appoint an executive director (4) 27 to serve at its pleasure, who shall perform the duties 28 assigned to him or her by the commission. The executive 29 director shall be the chief administrative officer of the 30 commission and shall be responsible for appointing all 31 3

1 employees and staff members of the commission, who shall serve 2 under his or her direction and control. 3 (5) Members of the commission shall serve without 4 compensation, but are entitled to reimbursement for per diem 5 and travel expenses incurred in the performance of their 6 duties as provided in section 112.061, Florida Statutes. 7 The commission shall: (6) 8 (a) Serve as a citizen board to coordinate the efforts 9 toward school readiness in this state and provide independent 10 policy analyses and recommendations to the Governor, the State 11 Board of Education, and the Legislature. 12 (b) Prepare and submit to the State Board of Education 13 a system for measuring school readiness. The system must 14 include a screening instrument, or instruments, which shall 15 provide objective data regarding the following expectations 16 for school readiness: 17 The child's immunizations and other health 1. 18 requirements as necessary. 19 The child's display of physical development 2. 20 appropriate for kindergarten. 21 The child's compliance with rules, limitations, and 3. 22 routines. 23 4. The child's successful engagement in kindergarten 24 tasks. 25 The child's demonstration of appropriate 5. 26 interactions with adults. 27 6. The child's demonstration of appropriate 28 interactions with peers. 29 The child's effective coping with challenges and 7. 30 frustrations. 31 4

Because children with 26 disabilities may not be able to meet all of the identified 27 expectations for school readiness, the plan for measuring 28 school readiness shall incorporate mechanisms for recognizing 29 the potential variations in expectations for school readiness 30 when serving children with disabilities and shall provide for 31 communities to serve children with disabilities. 5

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2	(d) Establish a method for collecting data from the
3	screening instrument and establish guidelines for using the
4	data so that the measurement, the data collection, and the use
5	of the data serve the statewide goal that all children will be
6	ready for school. The criteria for determining which data to
7	collect should be the usefulness of the data to state
8	policymakers and program administrators in administering
9	programs and allocating state funds.
10	(e) Contract with an independent entity for an
11	evaluation of the measurement system. The evaluation must
12	provide the information that local and state agencies, the
	Governor, and the Legislature need to provide for the
13	effective administration of programs that serve preschool
14	children. The evaluation must provide information that will
15 16	assist providers of private preschool and child care programs
16 17	in assessing the success of preschool and child care programs
17 18	and making decisions about improving program services to
10 19	prepare children for school.
19 20	(f) Recommend to the Governor, the Commissioner of
	Education, and the State Board of Education rules, and
21 22	revisions or repeal of rules, which would increase the
	effectiveness of programs that prepare children for school.
23	(g) Conduct studies and planning activities related to
24 25	the overall improvement and effectiveness of school-readiness
25 26	measures.
26	(h) Submit an annual report of its activities to the
27	Governor, the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the
28	House of Representatives, and the minority leaders of both
29 20	houses of the Legislature.
30 21	
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1 To ensure that the system for measuring school readiness is 2 comprehensive and appropriate statewide, as the system is 3 developed and implemented, the commission must consult with 4 representatives of district school systems, providers of 5 public and private child care, health care providers, large 6 and small employers, experts in education for children with 7 disabilities, and experts in child development. 8 (7) The commission may adopt rules necessary to 9 administer the provisions of this section relating to 10 preparation and implementation of the system for school 11 readiness, data collection, approving local coalition plans, 12 providing a method whereby a coalition could serve two or more 13 counties, awarding incentives to coalitions, and contracting 14 for an evaluation. 15 Section 2. School Readiness Coordinating Council.--16 The School Readiness Coordinating Council is (1)17 established with responsibility for advising the School 18 Readiness Commission regarding policies facilitating local 19 implementation, providing technical assistance, and helping to 20 secure waivers. 9	from among the business community and a vice chair.
10	(2) School Readiness Coordinating Council members are
11	entitled to receive per diem and expenses for travel, as
12	provided in section 112.061, Florida Statutes, while carrying
13	out the official business of the council. For administrative
14	purposes only, the council shall be assigned to the Office of
15	the Governor.
16	(3) The School Readiness Coordinating Council shall
17	meet and conduct business at least quarterly or as needed to
18	carry out the duties of the council.
19	(4) The School Readiness Coordinating Council shall be
20	staffed by the Office of the Governor and draw upon state
21	agency personnel and resources as needed to implement policy
22	necessary to facilitate the early education and child care
23	program.
24	(5) Quarterly meetings of the School Readiness
25	Coordinating Council shall be open to the public and
26	opportunity for public comment shall be made available at each
27	such meeting. The staff of the School Readiness Coordinating
28	Council shall notify all persons who request such notice as to
29	the date, time, and place of each quarterly meeting.

1 (1) LEGISLATIVE INTENT.--2 (a) The Legislature recognizes that high-quality early 3 education and child care programs increase children's chances 4 of achieving future educational success and becoming 5 productive members of society. It is the intent of the 6 Legislature that such programs be developmental, serve as 7 preventive measures for children at risk of future school 8 failure, enhance the educational readiness of all children, 9 and support family education and the involvement of parents in 10 their child's educational progress. Each early education and 11 child care program shall provide the elements necessary to 12 help prepare preschool children for school, including health 13 screening and referral, a developmentally appropriate 14 educational program, and opportunities for parental 15 involvement in the program. 16 It is legislative intent that all programs and (b) 17 services for Florida children in the first 5 years of life, 18 including health care, child care, child welfare, and formal 19 education, are school readiness programs. 20 (c) It is legislative intent that early education and 21 child care programs be operated within funding limits on a 22 full-day, year-round basis to enable parents to work and 23 become financially self-sufficient. 24 (d) It is legislative intent that early education and 25 child care programs not exist as isolated programs, but build 26 upon existing services and work in cooperation with other 27 programs for young children, and that these programs and 28 program funds be coordinated to achieve full effectiveness. 29 (e) It is legislative intent that the implementation 30 of an early education and child care program be optional on a 31 county-by-county basis. 10

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2	(f) Publicly funded early education and child care
3	programs are defined as prekindergarten early intervention
4	programs, Head Start programs, programs offered by public or
5	private providers of child care, preschool programs for
6	children with disabilities, programs for migrant children,
7	Title I programs, subsidized child care programs, teen parent
8	programs, and other services.
9	(2) CREATION OF OPTIONAL PROGRAM; EXEMPTIONSThe
10	early education and child care program consisting of publicly
11	funded programs listed in paragraph (1)(f) is established. The
12	early education and child care program is an optional program.
13	(3) PROGRAM ELIGIBILITYThe early education and
14	child care program shall be established for children from
15	birth to 6 years of age. The program shall consist of the
16	programs listed in paragraph (1)(f), be administered by the
17	School Readiness Coalition, and receive funds pursuant to SB
18	180 or similar legislation. Within funding limitations, the
19	School Readiness Coalition, along with all providers, shall
20	make reasonable efforts to accommodate the needs of children
20	for extended-day and extended-year services without
22	compromising the quality of the program.
23	(4) STANDARDS; OUTCOME MEASURES
24	(a) All publicly funded early education and child care
25	programs must meet the following performance standards and
26	outcome measures developed by the Department of Education and
20	the Department of Children and Family Services:
28	1. They must help prepare preschool children to enter
29	kindergarten ready to learn, as measured by criteria
30	established by the School Readiness Commission or, in the
31	absence of such criteria, by the School Readiness Checklist of

1 They must provide extended-day and extended-year 2. 2 services to the maximum extent possible. 3 There must be coordinated staff development and 3. 4 teaching opportunities. 5 4. There must be expanded access to community services 6 and resources for families to help achieve economic 7 self-sufficiency. 8 5. There must be a single point of entry and unified 9 waiting list. 10 If funding remains constant, they must serve at 6. 11 least as many children as were served prior to implementation 12 of the program. 13 (b) All participating publicly funded early education 14 and child care programs must implement a comprehensive program 15 of children and family services that enhance the cognitive and 16 physical development of children to achieve the performance 17 standards and outcome measures specified in paragraph (a). At 18 a minimum, these programs must contain the following elements: 19 Developmentally appropriate curriculum. 1. 20 An appropriate staff-to-child ratio, as required by 2. 21 the respective participating programs. 22 3. A healthy and safe environment. 23 A resource and referral network to assist parents 4. 24 in making an informed choice pursuant to s. 402.27. 25 SCHOOL READINESS COALITIONS. --(5) 26 (a)1. Each School Readiness Coalition must consist of 27 at least 12 members. Four members shall be appointed by the 28 district school board, four members shall be appointed by the 29 county commission for the county in which participating 30 schools are located, and four members shall be appointed by 31 the Department of Children and Family Services district 12

	Readiness Commission must be predicated on the submission of a

1 plan of implementation prepared and submitted by the School 2 Readiness Coalition. 3 (b) Each School Readiness Coalition shall develop a 4 plan for implementing the early education and child care 5 program to meet the requirements of this section. The plan 6 shall include a written description of the role of the program 7 in the district's effort to meet the first state education 8 goal, readiness to start school, including a description of 9 the plan to involve prekindergarten early intervention 10 programs, Head Start programs, programs offered by public or 11 private providers of child care, preschool programs for 12 children with disabilities, programs for migrant children, 13 Title I programs, subsidized child care programs, and teen 14 parent programs. The plan shall also demonstrate how the 15 program will ensure that each 3-year-old and 4-year-old child 16 in a publicly funded early education and child care program 17 receives scheduled activities and instruction designed to 18 prepare children to enter kindergarten ready to learn. Prior 19 to implementation of the program, the School Readiness 20 Coalition must submit the plan to the School Readiness 21 Commission for approval. The plan shall be reviewed and 22 revised as necessary, but not less than every 3 years. 23 The plan for the early education and child care (C) 24 program shall include the following minimum standards and 25 provisions: 26 1. A sliding fee scale, which is the same for all 27 programs, to be implemented and reflected in each program's 28 budget. 29 2. A choice of settings and locations in licensed, 30 registered, religious exempt, or school-based programs to be 31 provided to parents. 14

6	(d) Persons with an early childhood teaching
7	certificate may provide support and supervision to other staff
8 9 10	in the early education and child care program.
	(7) REIMBURSEMENT RATEThe School Readiness
	Coalition shall develop a reimbursement rate schedule that
11	encompasses all publicly funded early education and child care
12	programs and complies with applicable state and federal laws
13	and regulations. The reimbursement rate schedule must include
14	the projected number of children to be served and must be
15	submitted to the School Readiness Commission for approval.
16	Informal child care arrangements shall be reimbursed at not
17	more than 50 percent of the rate developed for family child
18	care.
18 19	(8) REQUIREMENTS RELATING TO FISCAL AGENTSThe
20	fiscal agent must be a public entity or a private nonprofit
20	organization. The fiscal agent shall be required to provide
21	all administrative and direct funding services as determined
22	by the School Readiness Coalition. The cost of these services
23 24	shall be negotiated between the fiscal agent and the School
24 25	Readiness Coalition. The fiscal agent shall be responsible for
25 26	monitoring all providers to ensure that coalition funds are
	expended in the manner and for the purpose required by the
27	funding source. Funds from the Early Education and Child Care
28	Trust Fund may not be paid to a provider unless the provider
29 20	agrees to allow the fiscal agent access to fulfill its
30	monitoring responsibilities.
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2	(9) PARENTAL CHOICE; PAYMENT ARRANGEMENTThe early
3	education and child care program shall be provided in a manner
4	that ensures, to the maximum extent possible, parental choice
5	through flexibility in early education and child care
6	arrangements and payment arrangements. Payment arrangements
7	must be in accordance with all federal and state laws that
8	govern the respective participating programs.
9	(10) EVALUATION AND ANNUAL REPORTEach School
10	Readiness Coalition shall conduct an evaluation of the
11	effectiveness of the early education and child care program,
12	including performance standards and outcome measures, and
13	shall provide an annual report and fiscal statement to the
14	School Readiness Commission, the Governor, and the President
15	of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives
16	for review by the Legislature. This report must conform to the
17	content and format specifications set by the School Readiness
18	Commission.
19	(11) CONFLICTING PROVISIONSIn the event of a
20	conflict between the provisions of this section and federal
20	requirements, the federal requirements shall control.
22	Section 4. Nothing in this act shall have the effect
23	of increasing the standards that must be met by family child
24	care providers; however, children who receive child care
25	services from family child care providers will participate in
26	school readiness assessment upon entering public or private
20	kindergarten or the first grade.
28	Section 5. Effective July 1, 1998, subsection (4) of
29	section 411.222, Florida Statutes, is repealed.
30	Section 6. Except as otherwise expressly provided in
31	this act, this act shall take effect upon becoming a law.
