Program. --

(1) It is the intent of the Legislature that a lottery-funded scholarship program be established for students who have demonstrated high academic achievement in high school and are ready for postsecondary education. Such a scholarship program shall be available to any student who meets high academic standards and who subsequently enrolls in a public or private Florida community college, university, college, or postsecondary vocational or technical program leading to a degree or skill certification.

- (2) The Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program is established and shall consist of two levels of award. The first level of award, which is the highest award, shall be for students who meet the most rigorous academic standards and qualify as Florida Academic Scholars. The second level of award shall be for students who graduate from high school with a 3.0 grade point average in courses required for graduation and who demonstrate readiness for a community college, university, or postsecondary vocational or technical program. Students at this level shall qualify either for a Florida Merit Scholarship award or a Florida Gold Seal Vocational Endorsement Scholarship award. These two awards shall be equivalent.
- (3) The program shall be administered by the Department of Education according to rules and procedures established by the Commissioner of Education. Advertising or notification to students, teachers, parents, guidance counselors, and principals, or other relevant school administrators, of the criteria and application procedures for the award shall be the responsibility of the department. Such advertising or notification shall begin no later than January of each year.

- (4) Funds allocated to the program shall be from the Educational Enhancement Trust Fund and shall be allocated prior to disbursement to public schools, community colleges, and state universities.
- (a) If funds appropriated by the Legislature are not sufficient to provide awards as authorized in law, awards in all three components of the program shall be prorated using the same percentage reduction.
- (b) If all funds allocated to the program are not fully utilized in a fiscal year, up to 5 percent of the total allocation may be carried over to fund potential shortages in future years.
- (5) The following shall apply to recipients of either level of award under the program:
- (a) Students may use awards for enrollment in any Florida public university, community college, or technical institute or any eligible Florida independent college, university, or vocational-technical school. An independent college, university, or vocational-technical school shall be eligible to participate if the following criteria are met:
- 1. It is an independent postsecondary institution that offers a nursing diploma approved by the Board of Nursing or a Florida college, university, or community college which is accredited by a member of the Commission on Recognition of Postsecondary Accreditation, the credits of which are acceptable for transfer to state universities; or
- 2. It is a nonpublic postsecondary educational institution licensed by the State Board of Independent Postsecondary Vocational, Technical, Trade, and Business Schools that:
 - Is located in and licensed to operate by the state.

- b. Has a program completion and placement rate at the minimum rate established under the Florida Administrative Code or current Florida Statutes which govern the institution or as established by the department.
 - c. Shows evidence of sound financial condition.
- d.(I) Is accredited at the institutional level by an accrediting agency recognized by the United States Department of Education and has operated in the state for 3 years under the same ownership and there have been no complaints for which probable cause has been found during this period; or
- (II) Is licensed by the state and has operated in the state for 5 years under the same ownership and there have been no complaints for which probable cause has been found during this period.
- (b) An award recipient shall be a full-time or part-time student enrolled in a minimum of 6 semester credit hours or the equivalent. To qualify for renewal, students must have completed at least 12 semester hours or the equivalent in an academic year. Students may be eligible for renewal awards for up to 7 years after high school graduation. Awards shall be disbursed each academic term. Students enrolled in 6 to 8 credit hours may receive up to one-half of the maximum award; students enrolled in 9 to 11 credit hours may receive up to three-fourths of the maximum award; and students enrolled in 12 or more credit hours may receive up to the full award.
- (c) An award recipient shall be allowed a one-time reinstatement upon raising his or her cumulative grade point average to the required level.
- (d) Students shall apply for a Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program award by April 1 of the last semester before high school graduation. Eligibility shall be determined

based on the cumulative grade point average in courses required for graduation as of application. Students who apply for awards no later than April 1 and who meet all other eligibility requirements to receive awards may later reapply to receive awards during subsequent application periods when they do not accept their initial awards. Similarly, students who receive initial awards and who later do not accept renewal awards may reapply to receive awards during subsequent application periods. Students who apply under this paragraph must submit reinstatement applications within 3 years after filing their initial applications.

- (e) Initial and subsequent renewal awards shall be limited to 132 credit hours if attending a 4-year program and 165 credit hours if attending an approved 5-year program. Awards may be used for summer-term enrollment if the Department of Education is notified by June 1 of the year preceding the summer term in which the student plans to enroll. No scholarship funds shall be applied to matriculation and fees for postsecondary remedial courses.
- (f) To be eligible, a student must not have been found guilty of a felony, or pled nolo contendere to a felony charge, unless granted clemency by the Governor and the Cabinet sitting as the Executive Office of Clemency.
- (g) To be eligible, a student must be a Florida resident.
- (h) Recipients must have met the requirements of a standard Florida high school diploma or its equivalent as described in s. 229.814, Florida Statutes. Any student who is enrolled on a full-time basis in the early admission program of an eligible postsecondary institution or completes a home education program according to the provisions of s. 232.02(4),

Florida Statutes, shall be exempt from this requirement. Also exempt shall be the dependents of Florida residents who are on military or public service assignments away from Florida when such dependents live with such Florida residents and receive high school diplomas from non-Florida schools.

- (i) The award may be renewed annually upon documentation by the recipient that he or she meets the necessary qualifications. If any recipient transfers from one eligible institution to another eligible institution, the award shall be transferable if the student is otherwise eligible for the award.
- (j) Program awards shall be awarded annually. Annual awards may be for up to 45 credit hours or the equivalent. Students wishing to renew an award shall notify the institution on forms approved by the Department of Education. The institution shall provide all required information to the department by June 1 of the academic year preceding the renewal year. Students whose grade point average is too low to qualify for a renewal shall receive a renewal if, by the end of the summer session, the cumulative grade point average meets the requirement. In such cases, the institution shall notify the department whether the grade point average may be increased sufficiently during the summer term. If not, the student shall be notified of nonrenewal for the next academic year. If it is possible for the student to raise the grade point average to the required level, an award shall be reserved for the student. The renewal, however, shall be granted only upon meeting the required grade point average. The institution may release the award upon verification of the acceptable grade point average.

(k) If a student does not meet the requirements of this subsection as a result of inaccurate or incomplete information provided by a high school guidance counselor, teacher, or school district personnel, the student may, nevertheless, be eligible for the award if the principal of the school or the district superintendent verifies that such inaccuracies or misinformation caused the deficiencies. The school district must provide a means for the student to correct deficiencies resulting from such misinformation. The student must correct the deficiencies no later than December 31 immediately following high school graduation, either by completing comparable work at the postsecondary institution or by completing a directed individualized study program that is developed and administered by the school district. If the student does not complete the requirements necessary to correct the deficiencies by December 31 immediately following high school graduation, the student is ineligible to participate in the program.

- (6) Payment of an award shall be transmitted in advance of the registration period each semester on behalf of the student to the president of the university or community college, or the director of the area vocational-technical school, or his or her representative, except that the department may withhold payment if the receiving institution fails to report or to make refunds to the department as required in this subsection.
- (a) Within 30 days after the end of regular registration each semester, institutions shall certify to the department the eligibility status of each student who receives an award. The eligibility status of each student to receive a disbursement shall be determined by each institution as of

this date. Institutions are not required to reevaluate a student's eligibility status after this date for the purpose of revising an eligibility determination previously made. However, an institution must make refunds to the department for students who receive award disbursements and terminate enrollment for any reason during the academic term when the institution's refund policy permits a student to receive a refund.

- (b) An institution that receives funds from the program shall certify to the department the amount of funds disbursed to each student and shall remit to the department any undisbursed advances within 60 days after the end of regular registration.
- (7) A student is eligible for only one annual award from the program. However, a student may, upon meeting provisions of this section, move from one program to another.
- (a) A student receiving a Florida Academic Scholars award may become eligible for a Florida Merit Scholarship award upon failing to meet the renewal grade point average requirement for the Florida Academic Scholars award if he or she meets the renewal criteria for the Florida Merit Scholarship award.
- (b) A student may transfer from a Florida Gold Seal Vocational Endorsement Scholarship award to a Florida Merit Scholarship award upon meeting the renewal grade point average requirement and being accepted in an upper-division program or college in a public or private university or college.
- (8) A program award shall be awarded prior to the certification or award of a federal family education loan or federal direct loan and shall be considered in the

29 30 certification or calculation of the student's loan eligibility.

(9) Each institution that receives moneys through this program shall cause to be prepared an annual report that includes an independent external audit or an audit prepared by the Office of the Auditor General. The report shall include an audit of the institution's administration of the program and a complete accounting of the moneys for the program. This report must be submitted to the Department of Education annually on or before March 1. The department may conduct its own annual audit of an institution's administration of the program. The department may request a refund of any moneys overpaid to the institution for the program. The department may suspend or revoke an institution's eligibility to receive future moneys for the program if the department finds that an institution has not complied with this section. The institution must remit within 60 days any refund requested in accordance with this subsection.

Section 2. Florida Academic Scholars award.--

- (1) In addition to criteria specified in section 1 of this act, a student may qualify for a Florida Academic Scholars award if the following requirements are met:
- (a) The student has a 3.5 unweighted grade point average on a 4.0 scale, or the equivalent, in high school subjects for credit acceptable for a college preparatory curriculum as approved by the Board of Regents and State Board of Community Colleges and the student has attained at least the minimum score as determined by rules of the Department of Education on the combined verbal and quantitative parts of the Scholastic Aptitude Test, the Scholastic Assessment Test, or the recentered Scholastic Assessment Test of the College

Entrance Examination or an equivalent score on the American College Testing Program;

- (b) The student has attended a home education program during grade levels 9 through 12 according to the provisions of s. 232.02(4), Florida Statutes, and has attained at least the minimum score as determined by rules of the Department of Education on the combined verbal and quantitative parts of the Scholastic Aptitude Test, the Scholastic Assessment Test, or the recentered Scholastic Assessment Test of the College Entrance Examination or an equivalent score on the American College Testing Program;
- (c) The student has been awarded an International Baccalaureate Diploma from the International Baccalaureate Office; or
- (d) The student is recognized by the merit or achievement programs of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation as a scholar or finalist.

Effective with the 1998-1999 school year, a student must complete a program of community service work, as approved by the district school board or the administrators of a nonpublic school, which shall include a minimum of 75 hours of service work and require the student to identify a social problem that interests him or her, develop a plan for his or her personal involvement in addressing the problem, and, through papers or other presentations, evaluate and reflect upon his or her experience.

(2) A renewal award shall be made to students who have maintained the equivalent of a 3.0 cumulative grade point average on a 4.0 scale for all college work attempted. The Department of Education shall not make awards to reinstatement

applicants who submit applications that are postmarked after June 1.

- (3) Florida Academic Scholars shall be eliqible for an award equal to that required to pay matriculation, mandatory fees, and \$600 for college-related expenses annually. Awards for students attending nonpublic institutions shall be limited to the average matriculation and fees of a comparable Florida public institution.
- (4) In each school district, the Florida Academic Scholar with the highest grade point average shall receive an additional award of \$1,500 for college-related expenses. This award shall be funded from the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program.

Section 3. Florida Merit Scholarship award.--

- (1) In addition to criteria specified in section 1 of this act, a student may qualify for a Florida Merit Scholarship award if the following requirements are met:
- (a)1. The student has a 3.0 unweighted grade point average on a 4.0 scale, or the equivalent, in high school subjects for credit acceptable for a college preparatory curriculum as approved by the Board of Regents and State Board of Community Colleges; and
- 2. The student has attained at least the minimum score as determined by rules of the Department of Education on the combined verbal and quantitative parts of the Scholastic Aptitude Test, the Scholastic Assessment Test, or the recentered Scholastic Assessment Test of the College Entrance Examination or an equivalent score on the American College Testing Program; or
- (b) The student has attended a home education program during grade levels 9 through 12 according to the provisions

of s. 232.02(4), Florida Statutes, and has attained at least the minimum score as determined by rules of the Department of Education on the combined verbal and quantitative parts of the Scholastic Aptitude Test, the Scholastic Assessment Test, or the recentered Scholastic Assessment Test of the College Entrance Examination or an equivalent score on the American College Testing Program.

- (2) A Florida Merit Scholarship award shall be an amount equal to 75 percent of the matriculation and mandatory fees of the institution being attended. Awards for nonpublic institutions shall be limited to that of the average matriculation and fees of a comparable Florida public institution.
- (3) A renewal award shall be made to students who have maintained the equivalent of a 2.75 cumulative grade point average on a 4.0 scale for all college work attempted. The Department of Education shall not make awards to reinstatement applicants who submit applications that are postmarked after June 1 preceding the renewal academic year.

Section 4. Florida Gold Seal Vocational Endorsement Scholarship award.--

- (1) There is created the Florida Gold Seal Vocational Endorsement Scholarship award within the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program in order to recognize and reward academic achievement and vocational preparation by high school students and to inform potential employers of the quality of a student's academic and vocational preparation.
- (2) Each school district may award the Florida Gold Seal Vocational Endorsement to a high school student who meets the requirements of this section. To be eligible for award of the Florida Gold Seal Vocational Endorsement, a student must:

(a) Meet all requirements for graduation as specified in s. 232.246, Florida Statutes, including number of credits, courses, grade point average, and mastery of minimum performance standards and basic skills.

- (b) Complete three vocational credits over a period of at least 2 years in a sequential program of studies in a vocational job-preparatory or technology-education program. On-the-job training credit may not be substituted for the three vocational credits. A student must complete the secondary school portion of a sequential program of studies which requires at least three secondary school vocational credits taken over at least 2 academic years, and is continued in a planned, related postsecondary education program. If the student's school does not offer such a two-plus-two program, the student is eligible for a vocational endorsement if the student completes a job-preparatory vocational education program selected by the Occupational Forecasting Conference or the Jobs and Education Partnership of Enterprise Florida for its ability to provide high-wage employment in an occupation with high potential for employment opportunities.
- (c) Demonstrate readiness for postsecondary education by earning a passing score on the Florida College Placement Test.
- (d) Earn a minimum cumulative unweighted grade point average of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale on all subjects required for a standard high school diploma.
- (e) Earn a minimum unweighted grade point average of 3.5 on a 4.0 scale for <u>secondary vocational courses comprising</u> the vocational program.
- (3) The Florida Gold Seal Vocational Endorsement Scholarship award shall be an amount equal to 75 percent of

the matriculation and mandatory fees of the institution being attended. Awards for nonpublic institutions shall be limited to that of the average costs of a comparable Florida public institution.

- (4) A renewal award shall be made to students who have maintained the equivalent of a 2.75 cumulative grade point average on a 4.0 scale for all college work attempted. The Department of Education shall not make awards to reinstatement applicants who submit applications after June 1 preceding the renewal academic year.
- (5) The Florida Gold Seal Vocational Endorsement Scholarship award shall be limited to 80 credit hours or the equivalent. After completion of 80 credit hours or the equivalent, a student who is accepted into an upper division or college within a public or private college or university, and who has a cumulative grade point average of 2.75 in all postsecondary work, may apply for and be granted a Florida Merit Scholarship award. All other provisions for the Florida Merit Scholarship award shall apply, and the limitations shall be calculated as if the student had used the first 2 years of the Florida Merit Scholarship award.

Section 5. Eligibility for scholarship awards; transition.--

- (1) Students who graduate from high school in 1997 or earlier and who are eligible for the Florida Undergraduate Scholar's Program pursuant to s. 240.402, Florida Statutes, shall be eligible for the Florida Academic Scholars award under section 2 of this act.
- (2) Students who graduate from high school in 1997 or earlier and who are eligible for the Vocational Gold Seal Endorsement Scholarship award pursuant to s. 240.4021, Florida

Statutes, shall be eligible for the Florida Gold Seal Vocational Endorsement Scholarship award under section 3 of this act.

Section 6. Paragraph (b) of subsection (5) of section 24.121, Florida Statutes, 1996 Supplement, is amended, paragraph (e) is redesignated as paragraph (f), and a new paragraph (e) is added to said subsection, to read:

- (b) Except as provided in paragraphs (c), and (d) and (e), the Legislature shall equitably apportion moneys in the trust fund among public schools, community colleges, and universities.
- (e) All components of the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program shall be funded annually from the Educational Enhancement Trust Fund. Funds shall be allocated to this program prior to application of the formula for equitable distribution to public schools, community colleges, and state universities. If shortages require reductions in estimated distributions from the Educational Enhancement Trust Fund, funds for the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program shall be reduced only after reductions in all other distributions are made.

Section 7. Sections 232.2465, 239.217, 240.402, and 240.4021, Florida Statutes, and section 240.4024, Florida Statutes, as created by section 2 of chapter 96-341, Laws of Florida, are hereby repealed.

Section 8. Paragraph (b) of subsection (3) of section 240.233, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

240.233 Universities; admissions of students.--Each university shall govern admissions of students, subject to this section and rules of the Board of Regents.

(b) Within the admission standards provided for in subsection (1), the Board of Regents shall develop procedures for weighting courses which are necessary to meet the requirements of a college preparatory curriculum s. 232.2465 at a higher value than less rigorous courses. Credits received in such courses shall be given greater value in determining admission by universities than cumulative grade point averages in high school.

Section 9. Subsection (9) of section 232.246, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

232.246 General requirements for high school graduation.--

(9) A student who meets all requirements prescribed in subsections (1), (5), and (6) shall be awarded a standard diploma in a form prescribed by the state board. A school board may attach the Florida gold seal vocational endorsement to a standard diploma pursuant to s. 239.217 or, in lieu of the standard diploma, award differentiated diplomas to those exceeding the prescribed minimums. A student who completes the minimum number of credits and other requirements prescribed by subsections (1) and (5), but who is unable to meet the standards of paragraph (6)(a), paragraph (6)(b), or paragraph (6)(d), shall be awarded a certificate of completion in a form prescribed by the state board. However, any student who is otherwise entitled to a certificate of completion may elect to remain in the secondary school either as a full-time student or a part-time student for up to 1 additional year and receive

Section 10. Paragraph (a) of subsection (1) of section 240.404, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

240.404 General requirements for student eligibility for state financial aid. --

- (1)(a) The general requirements for eligibility of students for state financial aid awards consist of the following:
- Acceptance at a state university or community college; a nursing diploma school approved by the Florida Board of Nursing; a Florida college, university, or community college which is accredited by a member of the Commission on Recognition of Postsecondary Accreditation; any Florida institution the credits of which are acceptable for transfer to state universities; any area technical center; or any private vocational-technical institution accredited by a member of the Commission on Recognition of Postsecondary Accreditation.
- 2. Participation in the college-level communication and computation skills testing program. This requirement is limited to students seeking associate's or bachelor's degrees.
- 3. Residency in this state for no less than 1 year preceding the award of aid for a program established pursuant to s. 240.402, s. 240.4021,s. 240.4085, s. 240.409, s. 240.4093, s. 240.4095, s. 240.4097, s. 240.412, s. 240.4125, s. 240.413, s. 240.4987, s. 240.605, or s. 240.606. Residency in this state must be for purposes other than to obtain an education. Resident status for purposes of receiving state financial aid awards shall be determined in the same manner as

resident status for tuition purposes pursuant to s. 240.1201 and rules of the State Board of Education.

- 4. Compliance with Selective Service System registration requirements pursuant to s. 240.4045.
- 5. Submission of certification attesting to the accuracy, completeness, and correctness of information provided to demonstrate a student's eligibility to receive state financial aid awards. Falsification of such information shall result in the denial of any pending application and revocation of any award currently held to the extent that no further payments shall be made. Additionally, students who knowingly make false statements in order to receive state financial aid awards shall be guilty of a misdemeanor of the second degree subject to the provisions of s. 837.06 and shall be required to return all state financial aid awards wrongfully obtained.

Section 11. Section 240.40242, Florida Statutes, 1996 Supplement, is amended to read:

240.40242 Use of certain scholarship funds by children of deceased or disabled veterans. -- The criteria for the use of scholarship funds which apply to students under the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Postsecondary Tuition Program shall also apply to the children of deceased or disabled veterans who receive scholarships under chapter 295.

Section 12. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law.
