Section 1. Paragraph (a) of subsection (2) of section 562.45, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

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562.45 Penalties for violating Beverage Law; local ordinances; prohibiting regulation of certain activities or business transactions; requiring nondiscriminatory treatment; providing exceptions.--

(2)(a) Nothing contained in the Beverage Law shall be construed to affect or impair the power or right of any county or incorporated municipality of the state to enact ordinances regulating the hours of business and location of place of business, and prescribing sanitary regulations therefor, of any licensee under the Beverage Law within the county or corporate limits of such municipality. However, except for premises licensed on or before July 1, 1998, a location for on-premises consumption of alcoholic beverages may not be located within 500 feet of the real property that comprises a public or private elementary school, middle school, or secondary school unless the county or municipality approves the location as promoting the public health, safety, and general welfare of the community under proceedings as provided in s. 286.0115. The division may not issue a change in the series of a license or approve a change of a licensee's location unless the licensee provides documentation of proper zoning from the appropriate county or municipal zoning authorities.

562.11 Selling, giving, or serving alcoholic beverages to person under age 21; misrepresenting or misstating age or age of another to induce licensee to serve alcoholic beverages to person under 21; penalties.--

943.10(1), may use persons under the age of 21 to assist the officer in enforcement efforts by testing vendor compliance with the prohibitions established in this section.

(5)(a) If a person under 18 years of age is found by the court to have committed a noncriminal violation under this section and that person has failed to complete community service within 60 days, pay the fine as required by paragraph (1)(a) or paragraph (2)(a) within 30 days, or attend a school-approved anti-tobacco program, if locally available, the court must direct the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles to withhold issuance of or suspend the driver's license or driving privilege of that person for a period of 30 consecutive days.

(b) If a person under 18 years of age is found by the court to have committed a noncriminal violation under this section and that person has failed to pay the applicable fine as required by paragraph (1)(b) or paragraph (2)(b) within 30 days, the court must direct the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles to withhold issuance of or suspend the driver's license or driving privilege of that person for a period of 45 consecutive days.
