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A bill to be entitled An act relating to false identification; prohibiting a person from assuming the identity of another person and thereby causing an economic loss or legal disability; providing penalties; authorizing any person who suffers such economic loss or legal disability to apply to the court for an order to correct certain records; prohibiting a person who has been arrested or lawfully detained from giving a false name or false identification to a law enforcement officer or jail personnel; providing penalties; providing an enhanced penalty if any person suffers an economic loss or legal disability due to the offense; defining the term "economic loss"; providing an effective date.

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. <u>Unlawful assumption of identity.--</u>

(1) A person may not assume the identity of another person by any means, including the assumption of another person's identification number, and then act as that other person in any business or economic transaction, or in any legal matter, thereby causing an economic loss to any other person or business or causing a legal disability to any other person or business.

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(2) A violation of subsection (1) is:

 - (3) A person who is adversely affected by a violation of subsection (1) may apply to the court imposing the sentence for the violation for an order to correct any public record.

 The sentencing court may also issue an order to correct any private record, after notice and hearing, of any entity that conducts business in this state.
 - Section 2. <u>Giving false identification to a law</u> enforcement officer.--
 - (1) A person who has been arrested or lawfully detained by a law enforcement officer may not give a false name, or in any way falsely identify himself or herself, without also giving his or her true name, to a law enforcement officer or any jail or prison personnel.
 - (2) A violation of subsection (1) is:
 - (a) A misdemeanor of the first degree, punishable as provided in section 775.082 or section 775.083, Florida

 Statutes, if another person does not suffer an economic loss or any legal disability because of the violation.
 - (b) A felony of the third degree, punishable as provided in section 775.082, section 775.083, or section 775.084, Florida Statutes, if any other person suffers an economic loss or any legal disability because of the violation.

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            (c) As used in this subsection, the term "economic
     loss" means, but is not limited to, the loss of employment, an
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     inability to obtain employment, a demotion in employment, the
     loss of a business relationship, a negative statement in a
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     credit report, an inability to obtain credit, any costs
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     related to an arrest made due to the violation of subsection
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    1), or any costs incurred in correcting a public or private
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    record.
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             Section 3. This act shall take effect October 1, 1998.
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    The Committee Substitute for Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 910 clarifies that it is unlawful for a person to give a false name or otherwise falsely identify himself or herself only if the person does not also give his or her true name.
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
