# I. Summary:

This bill creates the Small and Minority Business Trust Fund to receive moneys deposited or credited by legislative appropriation, grants, gifts, and contributions for the purpose of funding the Small and Minority Business Management and Technical Assistance Program. The fund is to be administered by the Small Business and Economic Development Office within the Commission on Small Business and Economic Development.

Pursuant to s. 19(f)(2), Art. III of the State Constitution, the Small and Minority Business Trust Fund shall be terminated on July 1, 2003, unless terminated sooner. The bill provides for a review and recommendation on whether or not the trust fund should be re-created prior to its termination.

This bill creates yet numbered sections of the Florida Statutes.

#### II. Present Situation:

Article III, s. 19(f)(1), State Constitution, requires each state trust fund to be created by "a three-fifths vote of the membership of each house of the legislature in a separate bill for that purpose only."

## III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

This bill creates the Small and Minority Business Trust Fund. The fund is to be administered by the Small Business and Economic Development Office within the Commission on Small Business and Economic Development. Under the companion bill (SB 1684), the Small Business Economic Development Office is created within the Commission on Small Business and Economic Development. Senate Bill 1684 further houses the commission in the Office of Tourism, Trade, and Economic Development, Office of the Governor.

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Funds may be deposited or credited into the Small and Minority Business Trust Fund by legislative appropriation, grants, gifts, and contributions for the purpose of funding the Small and Minority Business Management and Technical Assistance Program provided in Senate Bill 1684 or similar legislation. The Small Business and Economic Development Office may receive grants that require matching funds from the state to be deposited into the fund.

Pursuant to s. 19(f)(2), Art. III of the State Constitution, the Small and Minority Business Trust Fund shall be terminated on July 1, 2003, unless terminated sooner. The bill provides for a review and recommendation on whether or not the trust fund should be re-created prior to its termination. The review and recommendation are made by the commission and the Governor as chair of the commission, to the President of the Senate, and to the Speaker of the House of Representatives. Provisions are made as to the termination procedures if the trust fund is
