I. Summary:

This legislation re-creates the Child Support Incentive Trust Fund without modification effective for the period July 1, 2003 to November 4, 2004 and places it on the standard review cycle. The Child Support Incentive Trust Fund, FLAIR #73-2-075, is administered by the Department of Revenue.

II. Present Situation:

The Child Support Incentive Trust Fund is used to control and account for federal incentive earnings and program income for the child support program. All child support enforcement federal incentive earnings and that portion of the state share of public assistance collections recovered by the Child Support program which is in excess of the amount required by statute are to be transferred to the Department of Children and Family Services. According to Comptroller data, receipts to this fund for FY 1997-98 were \$27 million.
