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1 Health, and the Legislature; providing an 2 effective date. 3 4 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida: 5 б Section 1. Section 215.5601, Florida Statutes, is 7 created to read: 8 215.5601 Lawton Chiles Endowment Fund for Health and 9 Human Services. --10 (1) SHORT TITLE.--This section may be cited as the 11 "Lawton Chiles Endowment Fund for Health and Human Services 12 Act." 13 (2) DEFINITIONS.--As used in this section: (a) "Board" means the State Board of Administration 14 15 established by s. 16, Art. IX of the State Constitution of 1885 and incorporated into s. 9(c), Art. XII of the State 16 17 Constitution of 1968. "Endowment" means the Lawton Chiles Endowment Fund 18 (b) 19 for Health and Human Services. 20 (c) "Earnings" means all income generated by 21 investments and the net change in the market value of assets. "State agency" or "state agencies" means the 22 (d) Department of Health, the Department of Children and Family 23 24 Services, the Department of Elderly Affairs, or the Agency for 25 Health Care Administration, or any combination thereof, as the context indicates. 26 27 (3) LEGISLATIVE INTENT.--It is the intent of the 28 Legislature to: 29 Provide a perpetual source of funding for the (a) 30 future of health and human services initiatives, including, 31 2

1 but not limited to, facilities and biomedical research 2 activities. 3 (b) Ensure that enhancement revenues will be available to finance these important initiatives. 4 5 (c) Use tobacco settlement moneys to ensure the б financial security of vital health and human services 7 programs. 8 (d) Encourage the development of community-based solutions to strengthen and improve the quality of life of 9 10 Florida's most vulnerable citizens. 11 (e) Provide funds for cancer research and public-health research for diseases linked to tobacco use. 12 (4) LAWTON CHILES ENDOWMENT FUND FOR HEALTH AND HUMAN 13 SERVICES; CREATION; PURPOSES AND USES. --14 There is created the Lawton Chiles Endowment Fund 15 (a) for Health and Human Services, to be administered by the State 16 17 Board of Administration. The endowment shall serve as a clearing trust fund not subject to termination pursuant to s. 18 19 19(f), Art. III of the State Constitution and shall be funded 20 by settlement moneys received from the tobacco industry. The endowment fund shall be exempt from the service charges 21 22 imposed by s. 215.20. (b) Funds from the endowment shall be distributed by 23 24 the board to trust funds of the state agencies in the amounts 25 indicated by reference to the legislative appropriations for the state agencies, except as otherwise provided in this 26 27 section. 28 The state agencies shall use the funds from the (C) 29 endowment to enhance or support increases in clients served or 30 in program costs in health and human services program areas. 31

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1	(d) The Secretary of Health, the Secretary of Children
2	and Family Services, the Secretary of Elderly Affairs, and the
3	Director of Health Care Administration shall conduct meetings
4	to discuss program priorities for endowment funding prior to
5	submitting their budget requests to the Executive Office of
6	the Governor and the Legislature. The purpose of the meetings
7	shall be to gain consensus for priority requests and
8	recommended endowment funding levels for those priority
9	requests. An agency head may not designate a proxy for these
10	meetings.
11	(e) Funds from the endowment may not be used to
12	supplant existing revenues.
13	(5) ADMINISTRATION OF THE ENDOWMENT
14	(a) The board is authorized to invest and reinvest
15	funds of the endowment in those securities listed in s.
16	215.47, in accordance with the fiduciary standards set forth
17	in s. 215.47(9) and consistent with an investment plan
18	developed by the executive director and approved by the board.
19	Costs and fees of the board for investment services shall be
20	deducted from the earnings accruing to the endowment.
21	(b) Funds available from the endowment for
22	distribution by the board shall only be 95 percent of the
23	annual earnings received on the endowment. Neither the
24	original principal, the annual earning reserve of 5 percent,
25	nor the deposits from the tobacco settlement for fiscal years
26	1999-2000 through 2002-2003 shall be available for
27	appropriation or distribution.
28	(c) The board shall establish a separate account for
29	the funds of the endowment. The board shall design and operate
30	an investment portfolio that maximizes the financial return to
31	the endowment, consistent with the risks inherent in each
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1 investment, and that is designed to preserve an appropriate diversification of the portfolio. 2 3 (d) No later than February 15, 2000, the board shall 4 report on the financial status of the endowment to the 5 Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the б President of the Senate, the chairs of the respective 7 appropriations and appropriate substantive committees of each 8 chamber, and the Revenue Estimating Conference. Thereafter, 9 the board shall make a status report to such persons no later 10 than August 15 and February 15 of each year. 11 (e) Accountability for funds from the endowment which have been appropriated to a state agency and distributed by 12 the board shall reside with the state agency. The board is not 13 responsible for the proper expenditure or accountability of 14 funds from the endowment after distribution to a state agency. 15 The board may collect a fee for service from the 16 (f) 17 endowment no greater than that charged to the Florida 18 Retirement System. 19 (6) AVAILABILITY OF FUNDS.--(a) Funds from the endowment shall not be available 20 21 for appropriation to a state agency until July 1, 2000. Beginning July 1, 2000, the maximum annual amount of endowment 22 funds that may be appropriated to a state agency from the 23 24 earnings on the principal shall not exceed the amount of 25 interest earnings from the previous year. (b) Notwithstanding the provisions of s. 216.301 and 26 27 pursuant to s. 216.351, all unencumbered balances of appropriations as of June 30 or undisbursed balances as of 28 29 December 31 shall revert to the endowment's principal. 30 ENDOWMENT PRINCIPAL; APPROPRIATION OF EARNINGS .--(7) 31

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1 (a) The following amounts are appropriated from the Department of Banking and Finance Tobacco Settlement Clearing 2 3 Trust Fund to the Lawton Chiles Endowment Fund for Health and 4 Human Services: 5 For fiscal year 1999-2000, \$500 million; 1. б For fiscal year 2000-2001, \$150 million; 2. 7 For fiscal year 2001-2002, \$250 million; and 3. 8 4. For fiscal year 2002-2003, \$100 million. 9 (b) The amounts appropriated under paragraph (a), 10 together with any additional funds that are appropriated, 11 constitute the principal of the endowment and are not available for appropriation from the endowment, as specified 12 in paragraph (5)(b). However, any interest or other earnings 13 on such amounts accruing to the endowment from the investment 14 of such moneys shall be available for appropriation by the 15 16 Legislature. 17 There is appropriated from the Lawton Chiles (C) Endowment Fund to the Connie Mack Biomedical Research Program 18 19 50 percent of the interest or other earnings accruing to the 20 endowment. Of the funds appropriated to the Connie Mack Biomedical Research Program, 50 percent shall be distributed 21 on a competitive-project basis as provided in this paragraph 22 and 50 percent shall be appropriated directly to institutions. 23 24 Funds provided directly to institutions shall be distributed 25 to the following: University of Florida Cancer Center, 20 percent. 26 1. University of Miami Medical Center, 20 percent. 27 2. 28 H. Lee Moffitt Cancer Center and Research 3. 29 Institute, 20 percent. 30 4. Florida State University Biomedical Research, 15 31 percent.

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1 5. Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University 2 Pharmacy Research, 10 percent. 3 6. Mayo Clinic, 5 percent. 4 7. University of South Florida Biomedical Research, 5 5 percent. б 8. Walt Disney Memorial Cancer Institute, 2.5 percent. 7 9. M.D. Anderson Cancer Center-Health Research 8 Institute, 2.5 percent. 9 Section 215.5602, Florida Statutes, is Section 2. 10 created to read: 11 215.5602 Connie Mack Biomedical Research Program. --(1) There is established within the Lawton Chiles 12 Endowment Fund the Connie Mack Biomedical Research Program to 13 support research initiatives that address the health care 14 problems of Floridians in the areas of cancer, cardiovascular 15 disease, stroke, and pulmonary disease. The long-term goals of 16 17 the program are to: (a) Improve the health of Floridians by researching 18 19 better treatments for cancer, cardiovascular disease, stroke, 20 and pulmonary disease. 21 (b) Expand the foundation of biomedical knowledge relating to the diagnosis and treatment of diseases related to 22 tobacco use, including cancer, cardiovascular disease, stroke, 23 24 and pulmonary disease. 25 (c) Improve the quality of the state's academic health centers by bringing the advances of biomedical research into 26 27 the training of physicians and other health care providers. 28 (d) Increase the state's per capita funding for 29 biomedical research by undertaking new initiatives in 30 biomedical research that will attract additional funding from 31 outside the state.

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1 (e) Stimulate economic activity in the state in areas related to biomedical research, such as the research and 2 3 production of pharmaceuticals, biotechnology, and medical 4 devices. 5 (2) Funds appropriated from the Lawton Chiles б Endowment Fund to the Department of Health for the purposes of 7 this section shall be used exclusively for the award of grants 8 and fellowships under the program established in this section; for research relating to the diagnosis and treatment of 9 10 diseases related to tobacco use, including cancer, 11 cardiovascular disease, stroke, and pulmonary disease; and for expenses incurred in the administration of this section. 12 There is created within the Department of Health 13 (3) 14 the Biomedical Research Advisory Council. The council shall consist of nine members, 15 (a) including: the chief executive officer of the Florida 16 Division of the American Cancer Society, or a designee; the 17 chief executive officer of the Florida/Puerto Rico Affiliate 18 19 of the American Heart Association, or a designee; and the chief executive officer of the American Lung Association of 20 Florida, or a designee. The Governor shall appoint the 21 remaining six members of the council, as follows: 22 Two members with expertise in the field of 23 1. 24 biomedical research. 25 2. One member with expertise in the field of behavioral or social research. 26 27 3. One member from a professional medical 28 organization. 29 4. One member from a research university in the state. 30 5. One member representing the general population of 31 the state.

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1 2 In making his appointments, the Governor shall select 3 primarily, but not exclusively, Floridians with biomedical and lay expertise in the general areas of cancer, cardiovascular 4 5 disease, stroke, and pulmonary disease. The Governor's б appointments shall be for a 3-year term and shall reflect the 7 diversity of the state's population. A council member 8 appointed by the Governor may not serve more than two 9 consecutive terms. 10 (b) The council shall adopt internal organizational 11 procedures as necessary for its efficient organization. 12 (c) The department shall provide such staff, information, and other assistance as is reasonably necessary 13 to assist the council in carrying out its responsibilities. 14 Members of the council shall serve without 15 (d) compensation, but may receive reimbursement as provided in s. 16 17 112.061 for travel and other necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their official duties. 18 19 (4) The council shall advise the Secretary of Health as to the direction and scope of the biomedical research 20 21 program. The responsibilities of the council may include, but 22 are not limited to: 23 (a) Providing advice on program priorities and 24 emphases. (b) Providing advice on the overall program budget. 25 Participating in periodic program evaluation. 26 (C) 27 Assisting in the development of guidelines to (d) ensure fairness, neutrality, and adherence to the principles 28 29 of merit and quality in the conduct of the program. 30 (e) Assisting in the development of appropriate linkages to nonacademic entities, such as voluntary 31

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organizations, health care delivery institutions, industry, 1 government agencies, and public officials. 2 3 (f) Developing criteria and standards for the award of 4 research grants. 5 (g) Developing administrative procedures relating to б solicitation, review, and award of research grants and 7 fellowships, to ensure an impartial, high-quality peer review 8 system. 9 (h) Developing and supervising research peer review 10 panels. 11 (i) Reviewing reports of peer review panels and making recommendations for research grants and fellowships. 12 (j) Developing and providing oversight regarding 13 mechanisms for the dissemination of research results. 14 (5)(a) Applications for biomedical research funding 15 under the program may be submitted from any university or 16 17 established research institute in the state. All qualified investigators in the state, regardless of institution 18 19 affiliation, shall have equal access and opportunity to 20 compete for the research funding. (b) Grants and fellowships shall be awarded by the 21 Secretary of Health, after consultation with the council, on 22 the basis of scientific merit, as determined by an open 23 24 competitive peer review process that ensures objectivity, 25 consistency, and high quality. The following types of 26 applications shall be considered for funding: 27 1. Investigator-initiated research grants. 28 2. Institutional research grants. 29 Predoctoral and postdoctoral research fellowships. 3. 30 To ensure that all proposals for research funding (6) 31 are appropriate and are evaluated fairly on the basis of

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1 scientific merit, the Secretary of Health, in consultation with the council, shall appoint a peer review panel of 2 3 independent, scientifically qualified individuals to review the scientific content of each proposal and establish its 4 5 scientific priority score. The priority scores shall be б forwarded to the council and must be considered in determining 7 which proposals shall be recommended for funding. 8 The council and the peer review panel shall (7) 9 establish and follow rigorous guidelines for ethical conduct 10 and adhere to a strict policy with regard to conflict of 11 interest. No member of the council or panel shall participate in any discussion or decision with respect to a research 12 proposal by any firm, entity, or agency with which the member 13 is associated as a member of the governing body or as an 14 employee, or with which the member has entered into a 15 contractual arrangement. Meetings of the council and the peer 16 17 review panels shall be subject to the provisions of chapter 119, s. 286.011, and s. 24, Art. I of the State Constitution. 18 19 (8) The department may contract on a competitive-bid basis with an appropriate entity to administer the program. 20 21 Administrative expenses may not exceed 15 percent of the total funds available to the program in any given year. 22 The department, after consultation with the 23 (9) 24 council, may adopt rules as necessary to implement this 25 section. (10) The council shall submit an annual progress 26 27 report on the state of biomedical research in this state to the Governor, the Secretary of Health, the President of the 28 29 Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives by 30 February 1. The report must include: 31

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(a) A list of research projects supported by grants or fellowships awarded under the program. (b) A list of recipients of program grants or fellowships. (c) A list of publications in peer reviewed journals б involving research supported by grants or fellowships awarded under the program. (d) The total amount of biomedical research funding currently flowing into the state. (e) New grants for biomedical research which were funded based on research supported by grants or fellowships awarded under the program. (f) Progress in the treatment of diseases related to tobacco use, including cancer, cardiovascular disease, stroke, and pulmonary disease. Section 3. This act shall take effect July 1, 1999.

1 STATEMENT OF SUBSTANTIAL CHANGES CONTAINED IN COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR 2 SB 2422 and SB 1952 3 Changes the name of the endowment from the "Lawton Chiles Endowment Fund for Children and Elders," to the "Lawton Chiles Endowment Fund for Health and Human Services." (Page 1, lines 4 5 17 - 27) 6 Amends intent language (page 2, lines 4-15) to reflect the change in the title and scope of the endowment and include cancer research and public health research for diseases linked 7 8 to tobacco use. Amends the list of program purposes (page 3, lines 1-3) for which endowment funds can be used to reflect the change in scope of services and include facilities and biomedical research among the health and human services initiatives for which endowment proceeds may be used. 9 10 11 Amends the language related to availability of funds (page 4, line 21, through page 5, line 5) to provide that appropriations from the endowment for any given fiscal year shall not exceed the amount of interest earnings on the endowment fund from the prior fiscal year. Further restricts annual expenditures from endowment earnings to no more than 95% of the of the annual earnings, with the remaining 5% redeposited to the endowment. Provides than neither deposits made through FY 2002-2003 nor the 5% annual reserve will be available for appropriation or distribution. 12 13 14 15 16 17 Creates the Connie Mack Biomedical Research Program within the endowment; provides goals for the program; creates a Department of Health Biomedical Research Advisory Council, establishes its membership and delineates functions; establishes grant application and review processes and 18 19 20 criteria; requires annual report. Appropriates 50% of the interest or other earnings accruing to the Endowment to the Connie Mack Biomedical Research Program.
