I. Summary:

SB 1280 removes the provision from s. 400.962, F.S., requiring the licensure of a comprehensive transitional educational program. These programs are currently licensed under s. 393.067, F.S., and licensure under two statutory authorities is not appropriate.

This bill amends section 400.962, of the Florida Statutes.

II. Present Situation:

Section 393.067, F.S., and s. 400.962, F.S., currently require that a comprehensive transitional educational program be licensed under its authority. There is no programmatic reason for this type facility to be licensed under two statutory authorities. Because this facility is a developmental services community program, licensure should continue under s. 393.067, F.S. Intermediate care facilities for the developmentally disabled are licensed under s. 400.962, F.S.

Carlton Palms in Mt. Dora, Florida, is the state's only comprehensive transitional educational program and is licensed for 76 beds

SB 1280 removes the provision from s. 400.962, F.S., requiring the licensure of a comprehensive transitional educational program. Under this bill, a comprehensive transitional educational program would be licensed under s. 393.067, F.S., only.
