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18	Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:
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20	Section 1. This act may be cited as the Florida
21	Alzheimer's Training Act.
22	Section 2. Section 400.4178, Florida Statutes, is

24	400.4178 Special Care for persons with Alzheimer's

26	(1) Any A facility which admits or advertises that it
27	provides special care <u>to an individual</u> for persons with
28	Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders must meet the
29	following standards of operation:
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- (a)1. If the facility has 17 or more residents, have an awake staff member on duty at all hours of the day and night; or
- 2. If the facility has fewer than 17 residents, have an awake staff member on duty at all hours of the day and night or have mechanisms in place to monitor and ensure the safety of the facility's residents.
- (b) Offer activities specifically designed for persons who are cognitively impaired.
- (c) Have a physical environment that provides for the safety and welfare of the facility's residents.
- (d) Employ staff who have completed the training and continuing education required in <u>subsections</u> subsection (2) and (3).
- (2)(a) An individual who is employed by a facility that provides special care for residents with Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders, and who has regular contact with such residents, must complete up to 4 hours of initial dementia-specific training developed or approved by the department. The training shall be completed within 3 months after beginning employment and shall satisfy the core training requirements of s. 400.452(2)(g).
- (b) A direct caregiver who is employed by a facility that provides special care for residents with Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders, and who provides direct care to such residents, must complete the required initial training and 4 additional hours of training developed or approved by the department. The training shall be completed within 9 months after beginning employment and shall satisfy the core training requirements of s. 400.452(2)(g).

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(c) An individual who is employed by a facility that provides special care for residents with Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders, but who only has incidental contact with such residents, must be given, at a minimum, general information on interacting with individuals with Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders, within 3 months after beginning employment.

- (3) In addition to the training required under subsection (2), a direct caregiver must participate in a minimum of 4 contact hours of dementia-specific continuing education each calendar year as approved by the department. The continuing education must include one or more topics included in the dementia-specific training developed or approved by the department, in which the caregiver has not received previous training.
- (4) Upon completing any training listed in subsection (2), the employee or direct caregiver shall be issued a certificate that includes the name of the training provider, the topic covered, and the date and signature of the training provider. The certificate is evidence of completion of training in the identified topic, and the employee or direct caregiver is not required to repeat training in that topic if the employee or direct caregiver changes employment to a different facility or to a nursing home, home health agency, adult day care center, or adult family-care home. employee or direct caregiver must comply with other applicable continuing education requirements.
- (5) The department, or its designee, shall approve the initial and continuing education courses and providers.
- (6) The department shall keep a current list of 31 providers who are approved to provide initial and continuing

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education for staff of facilities that provide special care for persons with Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders.

- (7) Any facility in which more than 90 percent of whose residents receive monthly optional supplementation payments is not required to pay for the training and education programs required under this section. A facility that has one or more such residents shall pay a reduced fee that is proportional to the percentage of such residents in the facility. A facility that does not have any residents who receive monthly optional supplementation payments must pay a reasonable fee, as established by the department, for such training and education programs.
- (8) The department shall adopt rules to establish standards for trainers and training and to implement this section.

Section 3. Section 400.1755, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

400.1755 Care for persons with Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders.--

- (1)(a) An individual who is employed by a facility that provides care for residents with Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders must complete up to 4 hours of initial dementia-specific training developed or approved by the Department of Elderly Affairs. The training shall be completed within 3 months after beginning employment.
- (b) A direct caregiver who is employed by a facility that provides care for residents with Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders, and who provides direct care to such residents, must complete the required initial training and 4 additional hours of training developed or approved by the

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Department of Elderly Affairs. The training shall be completed within 9 months after beginning employment.

- (2) In addition to the training required under subsection (1), a direct caregiver must participate in a minimum of 4 contact hours of dementia-specific continuing education each calendar year as approved by the Department of Elderly Affairs.
- (3) Upon completing any training listed in subsection (1), the employee or direct caregiver shall be issued a certificate that includes the name of the training provider, the topic covered, and the date and signature of the training provider. The certificate is evidence of completion of training in the identified topic, and the employee or direct caregiver is not required to repeat training in that topic if the employee or direct caregiver changes employment to a different facility or to an assisted living facility, home health agency, adult day care center, or adult family-care home. - (6) Any facility in which more than 90 percent of whose residents receive monthly optional supplementation payments is not required to pay for the training and education programs required under this section. A facility that has one

or more such residents shall pay a reduced fee that is proportional to the percentage of such residents in the facility. A facility that does not have any residents who receive monthly optional supplementation payments must pay a reasonable fee, as established by the department, for such training and education programs.

(7) The Department of Elderly Affairs shall adopt rules to establish standards for trainers and training and to implement this section.

Section 4. Section 400.4786, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

400.4786 Care for persons with Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders.--

- (1)(a) An individual who is employed by a home health agency that provides care for persons with Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders must complete up to 4 hours of initial dementia-specific training developed or approved by the Department of Elderly Affairs. The training shall be completed within 3 months after beginning employment.
- (b) A direct caregiver who is employed by a home health agency that provides care for persons with Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders, and who provides direct care to such persons, must complete the required initial training and 4 additional hours of training developed or approved by the Department of Elderly Affairs. The training shall be completed within 9 months after beginning employment.
- (2) In addition to the training required under subsection (1), a direct caregiver must participate in a minimum of 4 contact hours of dementia-specific continuing education each calendar year as approved by the Department of Elderly Affairs.

The training shall be completed within 3 months after beginning employment.
- (b) A direct caregiver who is employed by an adult family-care home that provides care for residents with Alzheimer's disease or other related disorders, and who provides direct care to such residents, must complete the required initial training and 4 additional hours of training

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developed or approved by the department. The training shall be completed within 9 months after beginning employment.

- (2) In addition to the training required under subsection (1), a direct caregiver must participate in a minimum of 4 contact hours of dementia-specific continuing education each calendar year as approved by the department.

The department shall adopt rules to establish standards for trainers and training and to implement this section. Section 7. This act shall take effect October 1, 2001. SENATE SUMMARY Requires all employees of assisted living facilities that provide care for residents with Alzheimer's disease or related disorders, including those employees having only incidental contact with such residents, to complete incidental contact with such residents, to complete dementia-specific training. Requires such training for employees of nursing homes, home health agencies, adult day care centers, and adult family-care homes that provide care for persons with Alzheimer's disease or related disorders. Provides for certificates of such training. Prescribes duties of the Department of Elderly Affairs in approving training providers.
