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A bill to be entitled An act relating to health care facilities; creating the Florida Alzheimer's Training Act; creating ss. 400.1755, 400.4786, 400.55715, 400.626, F.S.; prescribing training standards for employees of nursing homes, home health agencies, adult day care centers, and adult family-care homes, respectively, that provide care for persons with Alzheimer's disease or related disorders; prescribing duties of the Department of Elderly Affairs; providing for compliance with guidelines within a certain time period; authorizing the department to enter into an agreement for evaluation of trainers and materials; providing legislative findings and intent; requiring dementia-specific care providers to be included in community care service systems; providing an effective date.

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. This act may be cited as the "Florida Alzheimer's Training Act."

Section 2. Section 400.1755, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

400.1755 Care for persons with Alzheimer's disease or related disorders.--

(1) As a condition of licensure, facilities licensed under this part must provide to each of their employees, upon beginning employment, basic written information about

interacting with persons with Alzheimer's disease or a related disorder.

The certificate is evidence of completion of training in the identified topic, and the employee or direct caregiver is not required to repeat training in that topic if the employee or direct caregiver changes employment to a different facility or to an assisted living facility, home health agency, adult day care center, or adult family-care home. (2) All employees who are expected to, or whose responsibilities require them to, have direct contact with residents with Alzheimer's disease or a related disorder must, in addition to being provided the information required in subsection (1), also have an initial training of at least 1 hour completed in the first 3 months after beginning employment. This training must include, but is not limited to, an overview of dementias and must provide basic skills in communicating with persons with dementia.

- with Alzheimer's disease or a related disorder shall be considered a direct caregiver and must complete the required initial training and an additional 3 hours of training within 9 months after beginning to work with the home health agency or nurse registry. Section 7. The Department of Elderly Affairs may contract with or enter into a cooperative agreement with a state university or statewide advocacy organization that possesses expertise in the area of Alzheimer's disease and related disorders to review potential trainers and training materials. The department may accept grants, donations, and gifts to meet the costs associated with providing the review and approval and the required training.

Section 8. The Legislature finds that Alzheimer's disease and related disorders pose an urgent health need in this state. Therefore, each state university, college, or postsecondary school that prepares undergraduate or graduate

students for health professions as described in chapter 456, Florida Statutes, is encouraged to include in its curriculum basic training about Alzheimer's disease and related disorders. Section 9. A community care service system must contain a dementia-specific care provider network to properly address the care of a person with dementia and the families of such person. Section 10. This act shall take effect July 1, 2001.

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4 5	Specifically states required Alzheimer's and related dementia training as "condition of licensure" for nursing homes, health agencies, nurse registries, ADCCs, and AFCHs.
6	Facilities must provide basic written information about

8 9	Reduces the number of initial training hours for employees having "direct contact" only with Alzheimer's residents from 4 hours to at least 1 hour.
