B. PRESENT SITUATION:

The Florida Constitution provides, in Section 3 of Article III, that a "regular session of the legislature shall convene on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in March of each odd-numbered year, and on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in March, or such other date as may be fixed by law, of each even numbered year." Article III, Section 16, provides for the process and timing of Legislative Reapportionment including the apportionment of senatorial and representative districts, judicial reapportionment and review.

The Regular Session of the Legislature lasts for sixty days. Following the passage of reapportionment legislation there are State Supreme Court and Department of Justice reviews which must occur. The time frames for these review are such that to have the redistricting process completed prior to the qualifying dates for the 2002 elections (July 8 – 12, Congressional and July 15 - 19, Legislative), the beginning of the process needs to be very early in the calendar year.

In 1992 the Regular Session of Legislature convened on January 14th.

C. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

In accordance with Florida Constitution Article III, Section 3(b), the 2002 Regular Session of the Legislature may be set by general law. The bill the convening date of the 2002 Regular Session of the Legislature to be January 15, 2002.
