I. Summary:

The Committee Substitute for Senate Joint Resolution 488 does the following:

- Increases the terms of office for Florida Senators from 4 to 6 years and for Florida Representatives from 2 years to 4 years, and provides for staggered terms;
- Increases the current term limits disqualification for Florida Representatives and Florida Senators from 8 years to 12 years.

This joint resolution proposes substantial amendments to the following provisions of the Florida Constitution: Art. III, s. 15 and Art. VI, s. 4.

II. Present Situation:

The term of office for Florida Senators is four years (some Senators may serve two year terms following reapportionment) and the term for Florida Representatives is two years. The Florida Lieutenant Governor and Cabinet members serve four year terms.

The Florida Constitution provides that a Florida Senator, Florida Representative, Florida Lieutenant Governor, Florida Cabinet member, U.S. Representative from Florida, or U.S. Senator from Florida, may not have his or her name on the ballot if the person has served eight consecutive years in that office. [The U.S. Supreme Court has held that state limits on the terms of federal office holders violate the U.S. Constitution. See generally, *U.S. Term Limits, Inc. v. Thornton*, 115 S.Ct. 1842 (1995).]

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

Committee Substitute for Senate Joint Resolution 488 increases the terms of office for Florida Senators from 4 to 6 years and for Florida Representatives from 2 years to 4 years, and provides for staggered terms. It also increases, from 8 to 12 years, the number of consecutive years during which Florida Representatives and Florida Senators may hold office before being prohibited from having their name listed on the ballot for re-election.
